### FOREWORD

In accordance with Section 9(3) of the Public Finance Management (PFM) Act 2005, Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development should prepare a budget framework paper that consist of the District Development Plan and the charter of Fiscal year responsively. In line with the above, Amolatar District in consultation with the relevant stakeholders organized to prepare a Budget Framework Paper for the Fiscal year 2022/2023 taking into consideration a balanced development as well as gender and equity planning and budgeting and COVID 19 responsiveness. The Budget Conference was organized on the 20th October 2021 at the District headquarters and was attended by all District Council members, Sub county leaders, Development Partners, Community Members, Cultural Leaders, Religious Leaders, opinion leaders among others. A number of successes for the FY 2021/22 were registered that picked up for key interventions to be taken up for improvements for the ensuing fiscal year FY2022/23 taking into consideration, the Programme implementation approach of the DDP and NDP3. A few key outputs for FY 20221/2 include; Complete the development of the Physical Development Plans and Local Area Plans in fulfillment of the provisions of the 2010 Physical Planning Act, Widening of the Revenue Base through identification of new revenue sources on top Local service tax and fully exploiting the current available sources, 3.Upgrade of Acii HCII to HCIII, completion of maternity ward at Amolatar HCIV, Purchase of medical equipment for Health facilities in Amolatar District, Completion of Etam Seed School and construction of another seed school, renovation of classrooms in primary, secondary and tertiary schools in the district, Support planting of tree in household to integrate energy and climate challenges, Routine surveys and statistical data production to enhance evidence based planning, Provide DPU support in terms of modern equipment computers, ICT materials, internet connectivity, software, M&E tools and data bank, Support all community members and leaders to participate in the planning, designing and implementation of development projects through the parish development model (PDM), Support six (6) strategic commodities for commercialization by all households and promote complete value chains i.e. fish, maize, cassava, oil seeds, rice and beef/dairy, Routine Road Maintenance of all District Roads, Drainage improvement on District Feeder Roads, Upgrading the stock and quality of tourism infrastructure, Routine Manual Road Maintenance of 284km District Road & Upgrading the stock and quality of tourism infrastructure.

The district continues to face a number of challenges including Low staffing levels, limited wage bill, difficulty in attracting and retaining of staff in hard to reach and stay areas, disasters which have continuously destroyed facilities like, schools and health facilities, and water sources, bridges and roads, among others. In the financial year 2022/2023, we hope to work hard to ensure that the funds are utilized as per the stipulated guides to meet all the targets for the financial year.

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#### Revenue Performance in the First Quarter of 2021/22

In the FY 2021/22, Amolatar district local government received an appropriated budget estimates of ugx 24,284,619,000 and received a quarter one allocation of ugx 6,575,769,000 which is 27% of the annual approved budget. The quarter one Revenue performance was 5% for locally raised revenues of ugx 30,900,000, 27% Discretionary Government Transfers of ugx 831,037,000, 30% Conditional Government Transfers of ugx 5,627,982,000, 7% Other Government Transfers of ugx 85,850,000 and 0% for external financing

#### Planned Revenues for FY 2022/23

Amolatar Districts expects a total recenue forecast of ugx(000) 22,507,712 in financial year 2022-2023. This is a reduction of 7.7% from 24,284,619 of financial year 2021-2022. the reduction is attributed to the termination of other Government transfers of Uganda sanitation fund (ugx 70, 000,000), NTD (ugx70,000,000), NUSAF(ugx 358,741,000) among others in the financial year 2021-2022. The 2022-23 revenue projections consists of Conditionan Government transfers(78.1%), Discretionery Government transfers (14%). Other Government transfers(4%), Locally raised revenues(2.3%) and Externel(Donor) funding(1.6%).

#### **Revenue Forecast for FY 2022/23**

#### Locally Raised Revenues

In 2022-2023, Amolatar District Local Government expects to allocate a total of Ugx 519,935,000= to Local revenues. This is a decline of 23.1% from the Ugx 676,169,000= of financial year 2021-2022. The reduced projections is due to the failure to realize the projections of 2021-2022, and also due to the shrinking in performance of the local revenue bases in the district. Local service taxes continue to be our biggest local revenue base at ugx 189,732,000=, followed by Street parking at ugx 87, 908,000=, sale of non-produced government properties/assests, at ugx 83,500,000=, among others

#### **Central Government Transfers**

The district expects to receive ugx 20,720,270,000=as central government transfers, which is an increase of 2.28% from ugx 20,257,908,000= of financial year 2021/2022. Ugx 17,578,802,000= of the Central Government transfers which is an increase of 3.4% from 2021/22 are Conditional Government transfers to cater for 1. wage in Education, Health, Production and marketing departments, 2. cater for conditional grants non wage, Transitional development grants, salary arrears, pension and gratuity for local government.

The discretionary government transfers of ugx 3,141,468,000= which is a reduction of 3.8% from ugx 3,264,137,000= of 2021/22. these are meant for DDEG activities/investments, unconditional grants ,wage and non wage, for both HLG/LLGs governments and and town Councils.

#### **External Financing**

The district projects to receive a total of ugx 368,336,000= in financial year 2022/23, same as for 2021/2022 financial year. The funds are contributed to by UNICEF (ugx 70,000,000=), Global fund (ugx 30,000,000=), WHO (ugx 150,000,000=), and GAVI (ugx 118,336,000=)

#### **Medium Term Expenditure Plans**

• We planned to Upgrade Acii HCII to HCIII, Construct a Twin staff house in Biko HC III. Construct a Store/DVS at District HQ, Fence Amolatar HC IV, Construct an incinerator at Amolatar HC IV, Construct 4 stance drainable toilets at Nakatiti, Etam, Anamwany, Namasale HCs, Procure medical equipments for Acii HC II, Complete a Maternity ward at Amolatar HC IV, Office chairs, on Immunization, we planned to cover 95% from 70%, Enhancing the health system to deal with the effect of covid 19 pandemic

• Reduce poverty by moving the masses (64% in subsistence Agriculture) from subsistence economy to commercialized and money economy. This will be achieved through implementation of single spine extension services, production support services and Parish Development Model using the whole-of-government approach and complete vale chain, complete value chain support, value addition, storage and agro-processing and Administrative capital support.

• Construction and rehabilitation valley dams, tanks and cattle dips-MWE

• Maintenance of 65km road link and construction of low Cost Sealing on District Roads, Borehole Rehabilitation and drilling to improve safe water coverage from 85% to 95%

- Restoration of the sensitive areas (wetlands, forest and lake shores, trees planting in the district public lands
- Establishment of fish and fish feed factory in the in the district-PPP.
- Establish demonstrations for value addition of silver fish (Mukene) and 4 aquaculture production technologies
- Business development center / skill center established

• Construction of seeds schools to all sub counties without secondary schools, equip schools with scholastic materials, Classrooms and human

resource to improve pass rates at both PLE and UCE levels, Improve literacy rates in the district
