# THE SECOND BUDGET CALL CIRCULAR ON FINALISATION OF THE BUDGET FOR FINANCIAL YEAR 2024/25

#### A. INTRODUCTION

- 1. This is to issue the Second Budget Call Circular for FY 2024/25 in line with Section 10 of the Public Finance Management Regulations, 2016 to facilitate the finalization of the Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure. The theme for the FY 2024/25 budget is "Full Monetization of Uganda's Economy Through: Commercial Agriculture, Industrialization, Expanding and Broadening Services, Digital Transformation and Market Access".
- 2. The purpose of this Circular is to communicate the following:
  - Priority Areas of the Budget for FY 2024/25 in line with the National Budget Framework Paper (NBFP) for FY 2024/2025;
  - ii. The Recommendations of Parliament on the NBFP for FY 2024/25;
  - iii. Government expenditure ceilings for FY 2024/25 as per the adjusted Program MTEF for FY 2024/25 and the Medium Term; and
  - iv. The policy and administrative guidelines for finalization of the Budget for FY 2024/25.

## B. THE PRIORITY AREAS OF THE BUDGET FOR FY 2024/25

**3.** Following consultations with Parliament, Cabinet and other stakeholders, the following priority areas were agreed to facilitate the achievement of Uganda's socio-economic transformation:

"To formulate sound economic policies, maximize revenue mobilization, ensure efficient allocation and accountability for public resources so as to achieve the most rapid and sustainable economic growth and development"

- i. Investing in the people of Uganda (Human Capital Development);
- ii. Peace and Security;
- iii. Roads and Railways;
- iv. Electricity;
- v. Prioritizing funding to money earning interventions;
- vi. Effective management of natural disasters; and
- vii. International Commitments.
- **4.** In addition, Government identified five key growth areas in the Strategy to grow the economy ten-fold from the current base of USD 49.5 billion in FY 2023/24 to USD. 500 billion over the next 15 years starting FY 2024/25. These are:
  - i. Agro-Industrialization
  - ii. Tourism Development;
  - iii. Mineral-based industrial development and Oil and Gas (including petrochemical industries); and
  - iv. Science, Technology and Innovation (Knowledge economy, research and development).
- **5.** In line with the Program approach to planning and budgeting, complementary interventions are programmed to be undertaken in all the NDPIII Programs to facilitate achievement of the targets in the above strategic areas.
- **6.** Details of the priorities for the FY 2024/25 budget are provided in the National Budget Framework Paper for FY 2024/25, accessible on the Ministry's website <a href="https://www.finance.go.ug">https://www.finance.go.ug</a> and the Budget information website <a href="https://www.budget.finance.go.ug">https://www.budget.finance.go.ug</a>
- C. RECOMMENDATIONS OF PARLIAMENT ON THE NBFP FOR FY 2024/25 AND THOSE FROM THE LOCAL GOVERNMENTS' REGIONAL BUDGET CONSULTATIVE WORKSHOPS FOR FY 2024/25.
- 7. Parliament approved the NBFP for FY 2024/25 with recommendations attached in **Annex 1**. Accounting Officers are urged to accommodate these recommendations in the Draft Estimates and the final workplans and budgets before submitting the Ministerial Policy Statements. This is critical to avoid adjustments during the appropriation process by Parliament.



- D. RESOURCE ENVELOPE AND EXPENDITURE CEILINGS FOR FY 2024/25
- 8. The Preliminary Resource Envelope for FY 2023/2024 issued in the 1st BCC amounted to Shs. 52.723 Trillion. This has since been revised upwards to Shs. 53.336 Trillion, of which Shs. 29.957 Trillion is Domestic Revenues; Shs. 311 Billion is Budget Support; 4.116 is Domestic Borrowing; Shs. 9.208 Trillion is Project Support; Shs. 9.455 Trillion is Domestic debt Refinancing; Shs. 287.1 Billion is NTR as detailed in Annex 2.
- 9. Please note that whereas the overall budget has increased, from Shs. 52.723 Trillion in FY 2023/24 to Shs. 53.336 Trillion in FY 2024/25, the discretionary resource has reduced by Shs. 3.469 Trillion from Shs. 25.205 Trillion to Shs 21.736 Trillion, which has to be optimised through coordinated fiscal and monetary policies between this Ministry and Bank of Uganda.
- 10. In addition, this Ministry recently undertook a baseline costing of all Votes and realized a shortfall of Shs. 4.934 trillion. Accordingly, all Accounting Officers must ensure all the fixed costs take the first call as they finalize their budgets.
- 11. Consequently, this Ministry has adjusted the MTEF and respective Budget Ceilings for Programs and Votes to cater for critical priorities for FY 2024/25 within the available resources. Respective Program Working Group Secretariats and Accounting Officers should ensure that their Vote allocations are in line with the revised MTEF in Annex 3.
- E. GUIDELINES FOR FINALISATION OF DETAILED BUDGET ESTIMATES AND MINISTERIAL POLICY STATEMENTS (MPSs)

#### Policy Guidelines

#### Deepening Fiscal Consolidation

- 12. Considering the prevailing budget constraint and the need to control debt and its servicing costs, the Ministry is implementing fiscal consolidation focusing on increasing domestic revenue mobilization, improving allocative efficiency and controlling domestic borrowing.
- 13. Accordingly, the following fiscal principles remain upheld as previously resolved by Cabinet in the Budget for FY 2023/2024:

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- i. Provide and protect funding for key priorities namely: policy commitments and fixed costs (PDM, emyooga, skilling programs); Human Capital Development; Peace and Security; Roads; Electricity; among others.
- ii. Support Private Sector Development by maintaining financing to Uganda Development Corporation, Microfinance Support Centre, Agriculture Credit Facility, Small Business Recovery Fund; among others;
- iii. Fast-tracking the implementation of the Domestic Revenue Mobilization Strategy (DRMS) measures to raise more revenue;
- iv. Reduce the pace of growth in debt over the medium term to minimize debt service payments and ensure debt sustainability;
- v. Limit travel abroad to only H.E the President, H.E the Vice President, Parliament, Judiciary, Prime Minister, Regional Cooperation, Diplomatic relations, critical travels for security, arbitration of Government cases, resource mobilization, and critical international sports competitions;
- vi. Restrict new vehicle purchase to only hospital ambulances, vehicles for medical supplies/distribution, agricultural extension services, security and revenue mobilization and optimize the management of existing fleet of Government vehicles.
- vii. Prioritize completion of critical on-going projects and other multiyear commitments as well as retooling projects; and
- viii. No new non-concessional projects shall commence, except those already provided for in the fiscal framework, or those with no direct or indirect claim on the Consolidated Fund.

#### Strategic Planning

- 14. It has been observed that some critical Programs expected to drive the socio-economic growth agenda of Government, need to undertake reforms as well as develop the necessary Policies, Plans and Strategies. My Ministry, in collaboration with the National Planning Authority, will in due course work with the relevant institutions undertake the necessary preparations including identifying the capacity requirements to carry out these reforms.
- 15. Our review of the BFPs submitted by the Institutions indicated that some resource allocation by MDAs is to items that do not focus on the core mandates of the Institutions. In addition, there is over-reliance on Consultancy Services even for activities that can be ably handled by staff in the MDAs. This is not acceptable. As you finalise your budgets you are urged to ensure that your budgets are allocated to



ensure efficient fulfilment of your mandates and desist from overrelying on outsourcing of activities to consultants. This Ministry will not hesitate to reallocate such misplaced budgets to other deserving areas.

- **16.** As you finalize your workplans and budget estimates for FY 2024/25, all Accounting Officers are guided as follows:
  - i. Ensure that wage, fixed and statutory costs are fully provided for;
  - ii. Operations and Maintenance of infrastructure and other assets should be budgeted for;
  - iii. Prioritize allocation to on-going Projects;
  - iv. Ensure that utilities including rent are fully provided for;
  - v. Prioritize allocation to investments that generate revenue; and
  - vi. Plan and budget within the available resources to avoid virements and supplementary requests during execution.

#### Non-Tax Revenue

- 17. The Public Finance Management Act, 2015 (amended) requires all MDAs collecting revenues to declare and remit any such collections to the Consolidated Fund for appropriation and where necessary, seek for supplementary in case of unanticipated over-performance. Accounting Officers are advised to strictly follow the law on the budgeting and application of non-tax revenue.
- 18. All NTR collecting institutions are urged to accurately estimate their collections and transparently declare all such generated revenue to facilitate proper budgeting. Supplementary expenditure will not be tolerated on account of poor projection of the anticipated collections.

## Construction of New Ministry Headquarters or Office Buildings

19. It has been observed that MDAs are planning and budgeting for construction of institutional headquarter offices under the retooling projects, and without seeking clearance from Office of the President and this Ministry. No new construction should be undertaken under the retooling projects. In addition, due to the need to focus resources on the priorities, no new construction of office accommodation will be allowed next financial year.

## Anti-Money Laundering and Counter-Terrorism Financing Activities (AML/CTF)

- 20. Uganda is under increased monitoring for global anti-money laundering following its placement on the Global Financial Action Taskforce (FATF) "grey list" due to identified AML/CTF strategic deficiencies. Since February 2020 Government has been working with the FATF through its International Corporation Review Group (ICRG) to address these strategic deficiencies in order to exit the grey list.
- 21. The Financial Intelligence Authority in collaboration with MoFPED and other Relevant Ministrics, Departments and Agencies undertook the Money Laundering and Terrorism Financing National Risk Assessment (NRA) for Uganda and produced a final report accessible on URL: <a href="https://www.fia.go.ug/sites/default/files/MONEY-LAUNDERING-AND-TERRORISM-FINANCING-NATIONAL-RISK-ASSESSMENT-2023.pdf">https://www.fia.go.ug/sites/default/files/MONEY-LAUNDERING-AND-TERRORISM-FINANCING-NATIONAL-RISK-ASSESSMENT-2023.pdf</a>, and an Action Plan aimed at addressing the identified risks.
- 22. All MDAs that have pending action items resulting from the National Risk Assessment 2023 and the FATF/ICRG Uganda Action Plan should plan and budget for their implementation in FY 2024/25 without fail as part of Government's strategy to sustain Uganda's efforts to get off the ICRG Grey

## Procurement of Grain and Grain Products

- 23. Several cases of food poisoning have been reported in various institutions, especially of learning, due to the effects of aflatoxins, adulterated quality standards and related post-harvest handling challenges of grain and grain products such as bread, maize flour among others.
- 24. All Government institutions (Local Governments, Uganda Police Force, Uganda Prisons Service, Education Institutions, the Uganda Peoples' Defense Forces among others) that procure grain and grain products are therefore advised to ensure their suppliers are verified and issued Certificates of Compliance by Uganda National Bureau of Standards (UNBS).
- **25.** This Ministry will soon send out a separate Circular with guidelines, requiring all Accounting Officers of Government of Uganda (and public

or institutional markets) to procure certified grain and grain products to guarantee quality, health and safety of all consumers in the country and for exports. On the same note, UNBS and Ministry of Education and Sports should ensure that private and public schools procure UNBS certified products.

### Administrative Guidelines

## Preparation of the Detailed Budget Estimates, Ministerial Policy Statements and Work plans for FY 2024/25

- **26.** As you prepare your detailed budget estimates and Ministerial Policy Statements for FY 2024/25, all Votes are reminded and guided as follows:
  - i. Government operates a cash budget and most of Government's obligations including loan repayments and statutory obligations fall due in the first quarter. In addition, revenue collections are low in this period thus minimal funds are available to finance other interventions. You are therefore, advised to plan and sequence your activities and cashflow requirements accordingly preferably in the second and subsequent quarters.
  - ii. Consider seasonality when finalizing your budgets. In this regard, all Accounting Officers should consider seasonal patterns in their expenditures when preparing their cashflow plans. This includes: institutions of learning to consider termly or semester requirements, and those involved in agriculture for planting seasons, among others.

# Streamlining the Management of External Funding/Off-budget Financing

- **27.** To streamline processes, enhance accountability, and address reporting complexities, all Ministries, Agencies, and Local Governments receiving additional funding in form of off-budget support, must adhere to the following:
  - i. Consolidate all off-budget funding within their respective budgets on both the Program Budgeting System (PBS) and the Aid Management Platform (AMP);

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- ii. Ensure that initiatives financed through off-budget funds align with the National Development Plan III (NDPIII), Programmatic Implementation Action Plans (PIAPs), and the Vote Development Plans
- iii. Furnish explicit workplans delineating interventions and anticipated outcomes from off-budget financing in line with the structure provided in the Program Budgeting System (PBS);
- iv. Ensure that the procurement of resources from Development Partners complies with Sections 36, 39, 42, and 44 of the Public Finance Management Act, 2015, as amended that gives the monopoly of resource mobilization on behalf of the Government to the Minister of Finance, Planning, and Economic Development.

## Budgeting for USAID G2G grants to Hospitals (Acct General to provide input)

- 28. There are seven (07) Regional Referral Hospitals that have been receiving grant aiding from USAID, some under Non-Wage Recurrent and others under Development. However, due to implementation challenges with the Development Partner (USAID), it was agreed that all implementing Hospitals should plan and budget for these funds in the PBS under Budget output 320020-HIV/AIDs Research, Healthcare & Outreach Services.
- 29. On that account therefore, vote 407 Jinja Referral Hospital and Vote 413 Mbarara Regional Referral Hospital which have been receiving the USAID Government-to-Government (G2G) funds under the Development project have also been shifted to Non-Wage Recurrent and their Vote Medium Term Expenditure Frameworks adjusted respectively.

### Tax Inclusive Budgeting

**30.** As you finalize your detailed budget estimates for FY 2024/25, all Accounting Officers are reminded to adhere to the Government policy of tax-inclusive planning and budgeting. Development expenditures should be tax inclusive of VAT, Import Duty for equipment and other auxiliary goods.

#### **Budgeting for Subventions**

- 31. All Central Government Ministries and Agencies that have transfers to other institutions/subventions are reminded to adequately budget for these transfers. Funds for the subventions should be captured under the respective Budget lines segregating the mandatory obligations such as wage and NSSF from other discretionary items.
- **32.** Effective FY 2024/25, subventions are required to capture their detailed work plans and budget estimates in the PBS, accordingly special budget output codes have been created under the PBS.

### **Budgeting for Domestic Arrears**

**33.** Government is committed to clearing outstanding verified domestic arrears in line with the Domestic Arrears Strategy. During the planning and budgeting for next financial year, Accounting Officers of the beneficiary Votes are urged to ensure that resources allocated for arrears are rightfully expended as per the attached schedule in **Annex 4.** 

## Budgeting for Titling and Acquisition of Land

**34.** To curb cases of encroachment or outright loss of land owned by government institutions, all Accounting Officers of Votes with untitled land must plan and budget for land titling in FY 2024/25.

## Mainstreaming Tourism in Meetings Incentives Conferences and Events (MICE)

will deliver its 10-fold economic growth agenda. This calls for investment in tourism development for a better experience and perception of Uganda by both citizens and visitors. To this end, MDAs and LGs are required to collaborate with the Uganda Tourism Board (UTB) to mainstream the National MICE Business Plan (2023-2025) in their annual workplan and budget. UTB will provide the necessary advisory and technical support for this purpose.



### 1Public Investment Management

## Credibility of the Public Investment Plan for FY 2024/25

- 36. The Development Committee (DC) undertook a review of the Public Investment Plan (PIP) for FY 2023/24 to review performance of the entire portfolio and identify projects to exit the PIP on account of the project expiry, poor performance over the years and financing related challenges among other reasons. Twelve new projects were admitted to the PIP for FY 2024/25 and assigned codes on account of their readiness for implementation; 34 projects (Annex 5) were exited from the PIP; 10 projects (Annex 6) were downgraded to the pipeline; 54 projects (Annex 7) extended and 12 projects (Annex 8) admitted in the PIP for FY 2024/25 respectively. Accordingly, all exited and downgraded projects have been frozen in the PBS and no resources can be allocated to their codes anymore.
- 37. Accounting Officers should allocate adequate resources to the new projects during the preparation of the Budget for FY 2024/25 and ensure that they are properly managed within the original timelines and cost.

Creating a critical mass of certified project managers across Government to implement projects.

- 38. While Government has made strides in reforming the Public Investment Management System (PIMS), especially project identification, preparation, appraisal and selection, there have been glaring capacity gaps observed during project implementation and management. This is partly attributed to lack of a critical mass of certified project management experts within MDAs to effectively implement and monitor projects to ensure that they are delivered on time, budget and with the right specifications. Accordingly, capacity building in the areas of project management should be prioritized next Financial Year.
- **39.** You are therefore, guided to facilitate Project Managers/Coordinators to attain Project Management Professional certification with the Project Management Institute (PMI) in a bid to ensure that projects are implemented with officers with the right skills and tools.



#### Asset Management

- **40.** Over the years, there have been inefficiencies in management of Government created assets due to non-prioritization of Operation and Maintenance(O&M) of assets generated. It has been realized that a number of MDAs have a high preference for acquisition of new assets with limited or no provisions for the maintenance of the existing ones.
- **41.** Similarly, it has been observed that some Central Government entities do not transfer full ownership of acquired assets to Local government institutions to facilitate their O&M. This has posed legal and administrative challenges on maintenance, accountability and eventual disposal.
- 42. Following the redesign for improved implementation of the Integrated Financial Management System (IFMS), it has been observed that implementation of capital expenditure on IFMS is currently facing a challenge of wrong budget items. This is evidenced from a number of votes that budget for recurrent expenditures against capital items. Accounting Officers are required to use correct codes in the chart of accounts during budgeting to avoid re-occurrence of this challenge.
- **43.** Accounting officers should therefore budget for expenditure on acquisition of assets on the **312XXX** as per the revised Chart of Accounts and **313XXX** on improvement of the quality of existing assets. The **313XXX** series of codes should exclusively be used to budget for; major improvement / overhaul /maintenance of assets that will increase the useful life of that asset.
- **44.** Please, note that any use of alternative account codes for asset acquisition is disallowed by the IFMS, without any exceptions. Furthermore, the use of asset acquisition codes for purposes other than the procurement of assets will be prohibited on the Integrated Financial Management System (IFMS).
- **45.** For the component of mechanization under Agro-Industrialization, all MDAs involved should plan and budget for operation and maintenance of tractors to ensure longevity and value for money.



- 46. Accounting Officers are further advised that Budgets for operation and maintenance of Assets that are recurrent in nature should be provided on the Non-Wage Recurrent budget codes 228001, 228002, 228003 and 228004.
- 47. You are hereby required to adhere to the GoU Asset Management Framework and Guidelines, 2020 in the management and control of public assets throughout the asset life cycle. The budgets for asset acquisition, maintenance, disposal/divestment should be in accordance with the entity's Asset Management Strategic Plan, which is aligned to the National Development Plan III, in order to deliver the Vote's mandate.

### Electronic Government Procurement (e-GP) system

- **48.** The Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development has planned to rollout the electronic government procurement (e-GP) system to 250 procuring and disposing entities (PDEs) in the Financial Year 2024/2025, in addition to the current 36 entities already using the system. The rest of the entities will be covered in the Financial Year 2025/2026.
- **49.** The entities rolled to will be expected to carry out their end to end procurement and disposal processes on the system. The e-GP system will also have a centralized national database of prequalified providers which will be updated periodically. A communication on the rollout roadmap will be shared accordingly, and a readiness assessment test is being undertaken on the 250 entities.

## Budgeting at branch level for votes with multiple branch offices

50. The budgets for funds utilized at vote branch should be broken down in detail at the branch level (embedded within vote cost centre code on IFMS) and specified account item code level, rather than being consolidated into a lump sum and transferred to the branch. This approach aims to deepen IFMS usage at all vote branches and guarantee accurate recording of all government expenditures in the IFMS at a granular expenditure level.



#### Disaggregation of budgets at Cost Centre Level

**51.** Budgets for all votes must consistently be broken down at the cost center level without any exceptions. This will allow for implementation of cost center controls and accountability measures on IFMS. It is imperative that budgets for various distinct departments are not merged into a singular department.

#### Budgeting for Salaries, Pension, Gratuity and severance package

- **52.** The Special Audit of the Government of Uganda Salary Payroll FY 2019/20 FY 2022/23 by the Office of the Auditor General established the main causes of wage shortfalls as follows: overpayment of salaries; payment of staff outside the payroll; mischarges; overpayment of loan deductions; over/under projection of wage budgets; irregular recruitment; payment of ghost staff and irregular transfers.
- 53. Therefore, Accounting Officers are reminded to address the above issues during budget preparation and avoid distortions during execution. In addition to the sanctions provided for under Section 45 (5) and (8) and Section 11 (2)(g) of the PFM Act 2015, Accounting Officers, Human Resource Officers and Finance Officers responsible for the anomalies will be held personally responsible for the payroll mismanagement and will take personal responsibility.
- **54.** The Ministry of Public Service and my Ministry are undertaking final consultations on the residual issues to arrive at the final wage allocations for FY 2024/25. These will be communicated in a circular to be issued shortly to facilitate budgeting for wage next financial year.
- **55.** Wage Allocations for FY 2024/2025 will therefore be based on the payroll audit findings.
- **56.** The Pension allocation for FY 2024/2025 is based on the Pensioners on the payroll, reported monthly Pension shortfalls, the new retirees for FY 2024/2025 and the estimated provision of the index of annual inflation for both FY 2023/24 and FY 2024/25 as guided by UBOS.



Accounting Officers should note this provision and allocate the resources in full.

- **57.** <u>Gratuity allocations</u> for FY 2024/2025 are based on projections as submitted by Accounting Officers to the Ministry of Public Service and Information on Pension lists uploaded on the Program Budgeting System.
- **58.** Budgeting for Gratuity: Gratuity payments to retirees should be aligned to the Annual and quarterly cashflow projections to ensure that adequate funds are released in the quarter when the expenditure falls due. This will stop the practice of partial payments of Gratuity which undermines the purpose of lump-sum advance to beneficiaries.
- **59.** Salaries, Pension and Gratuity Arrears: Provision for Salaries, Pension and Gratuity Arrears for FY 2024/2025 is based on the Accounting Officers' verified arrears claims submitted to this Ministry by 31st January, 2024. You are therefore reminded to budget ONLY for individual claims that were verified, and submitted to this Ministry by the above date.
- **60.** Severance package for the abolished positions like Accounts Assistant, Nursing Assistant, Office Copy Typist, has been made according to the filled staff in-post on the payroll. Accounting Officers are therefore advised to appropriately budget for this expenditure under the relevant cost Centre budget Item 273103: (Retrenchment Costs).

#### **Budgeting for Missions Abroad**

- **61.** Accounting Officers of Missions should ensure their workplans and budgets are detailed as follows:
  - i. Ensure full alignment to the NDPIII PIAPs, the Mission Charter and Strategic Plans.
  - ii. Program for 50% of your Budgets to be released in two tranches: 1st and 3rd quarters of the financial year respectively.
  - iii. Allocate adequate resources for Utilities especially rent to avoid further accumulation of arrears; and



iv. Properly capture all Non-Tax Revenue projections in the budget and remit all collections to the Consolidated Fund as required under the PFM Act, 2015 (Amended).

### LOCAL GOVERNMENT SPECIFIC ISSUES

**62.** The Local Government (LG) Indicative Planning Figures (IPFs) for FY2024/25 for all Programs, as generated off the Online Transfer Information Management System (OTIMS), are attached as **Annex 9.** You required to plan and budget as per the ceilings provided for your respective LGs communicated by this Ministry.

## **Automation of Local Revenue Collection**

- 63. Local Revenue collection has remained low. In FY2023/24, the combined Local Revenues projection for all Local Government Votes amounted to UShs. 284.6 Billion, which is significantly below the funding requirements by the Votes. The Local Revenue IPFs for FY 2024/25 have been provided based on individual vote submissions, and where no such submission was made and or/ those whose submission was received late beyond the deadline, the allocations submitted in the Budget Framework Papers and or/ the level of FY2023/24 were considered. Please ensure that, all your Local Revenue have been budgeted for appropriately and approved by the respective Local Councils together with other grants before submission to this Ministry in the Budget for appropriation by Parliament in line with the relevant Laws.
- **64.** In order to improve local revenue performance, Local Governments should plan and budget for full roll-out of the automated Local Revenue collection systems in order to adequately compliment the resources provided by the center. In addition, LGs that have already rolled-onto the automated systems should desist from using manual collection of revenues.
- **65.** The Ministry of Local Government, working with Local Government Finance Commission (LGFC) should plan for and fast-track full automation and harmonization of Local Revenue collection and the



attendant management systems in order to achieve optimal results in line with the Local Revenue Management Strategy.

## Budgeting for Funds appropriated under Central Government Votes but disbursed to Local Governments

66. There are a number of projects under Central Government Votes which, by design, have components where resources are specifically earmarked for support of interventions under Local Governments. Such projects include but not limited to Road Fund, and National Medical Stores, among others. However, some Local Governments do not prepare the detailed budget estimates, procurement plans and annual work plans for such funds causing unspent balances at the end of the financial year. All Votes with notification of such funds should budget for them accordingly to avoid implementation challenges during budget execution.

## Transfers to Local Governments

67. Central Government MDAs including Uganda Road Fund, Office of the Prime Minister, Ministry of Agriculture, Ministry of Local Government, Ministry of Health, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Gender Labor and Social Development and others, that have resources appropriated under their Votes but meant for disbursement to Local Governments should submit their IPFs to the Local Governments by 21st February 2024 to facilitate timely finalization of their Budgets.

## Use of Grant Guidelines

- **68.** The Local Government Management of Service Delivery (LGMSD) Performance Assessment provides an incentive for Local Governments to improve on their performance, and as such the results are used in the allocation of a portion of the Development Grants. Therefore, you are requested to observe strict adherence to Planning, budgeting and implementation Guidelines issued by line Ministries as you finalize your budget.
- **69.** In addition, we had consistently registered cases of budget adjustments as a result of budgeting for wrong items. As such, during budget finalization for FY 2024/25, Accounting Officers should ensure that all Heads of Departments are actively involved in the process



together with the CFOs who are the Heads of the Budget Desk to guide on the Chart of Accounts and avoid budgeting for wrong items that leads to frequent changes during budget execution.

## LG Program Implementation Action Plans (PIAP) Output Indicators

- 70. To address the concern of PIAP output indicators in the Program Budgeting System (PBS) not being aligned to LG requirements. NPA working with this Ministry, undertook an exercise to review the indicators, in consultation with selected LG representatives. The indicators aligned to LG requirements have been finalized and coded into the PBS for use during preparation of the Budgets for FY2024/25.
- 71. Relatedly, NPA in consultation with this Ministry and other key stakeholders, developed indicators for Environmental and Social Safeguards (E&S) across all Programs and these have also been incorporated into the PBS. Accounting Officers should mainstream E&S in all projects guided by these indicators.

## **Budgeting for Road Maintenance**

72. In FY2023/24, Government allocated Shs. 1bn to each Local Government for roads maintenance and Ministry of Works and Transport (MoWT) issued the required guidelines for utilization of these funds. This allocation has been maintained in the budget. Please note that these funds are strictly for road maintenance and should therefore be budgeted for under road maintenance as guided by MoWT.

# Ex-Gratia, Agricultural Extension Services and the Parish Development Model (PDM)

**73.** In FY2023/24, Government issued a Supplementary Budget for ExGratia, Agricultural Extension Services and the PDM. These additional allocations have been maintained in the Budget for FY 2024/25 and therefore LG Accounting Officers should budget accordingly for these categories.

## Deepening Fiscal Decentralization

- **74.** FY 2024/25 will be the final year of implementation of the UGIFT program. As such, focus has been placed on achieving all outstanding Disbursement Linked Indicator Actions agreed upon with World Bank under the program. Accordingly, financing provisions have been made for the following:
  - i) Completion of residual construction works under UGIFT Projects;
  - ii) Operationalization of All UGIFT projects including the Arua, Hoima and Soroti Regional Blood Banks, in terms of equipping, staffing, provision of capitation and operational funds;
  - iii) Transitioning of **20** additional health facilities under the refugee host Local Governments;
  - iv) Provision of additional Water Sources in underserved LGs;
  - v) Strengthening Results Based financing in Health; and
  - vi) National rollout of micro-scale irrigation under Agriculture.

## 75. Therefore, the Local Government Accounting Officers are requested to:

- i. Ensure all residual construction works for the UGIFT projects are completed without fail. There will not be further budget provisions related to these projects beyond FY 2024/25;
- ii. Adequately budget for staff recruitment required to operationalize the constructed projects in line with the wage provision for FY2024/25;
- Monitoring and Supervision of Projects: All LGs should adequately provide resources using the Project Investment Service Costs using budget code 225204 (Monitoring and supervision of capital works) to facilitate monthly, quarterly and joint monitoring and supervision by the Project Management Team (PMT);
- Budgeting for Environment and Social Safeguards Compliance: iv. Support supervision monitoring and implementation Environmental. Health and Safeguards to Social compliance for all Government Sites is inadequate and in some cases absent due to inadequate funds. Therefore, all Local Government Accounting Officers should allocate funds for activities aimed at enforcing compliance to Environment, Social, Health and Safety safeguards at all stages of project implementation. These

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- funds should be allocated under Output Item Code **000016** (Environmental Social Health and Safety).
- v. Co-financing of Irrigation Schemes by Farmers: In order to reduce dependency on rain fed agriculture, Government rolled out the Micro-Scale irrigation across the Country starting FY 2020/21. Under this scheme, Government intends to provide irrigation equipment to farmers under a co-financing arrangement i.e. 25% contribution by the farmer and 75% by Government. Local Governments are required to continue mobilizing the farmers to acquire equipment to boost their productivity and incomes.

Accounting Officers are requested to make adequate budget projections for the expected farmer contributions in FY 2024/25 as part of their expected Local Revenue projections to avoid execution challenges. These farmer contributions should therefore, be budgeted and managed in accordance with the Grant and Budget Guidelines issued by the Ministry of Agriculture, Animal Industry and Fisheries.

- vi. Transitioning of additional health facilities under the refugee host Local Governments: Ministry of Health should urgently guide the selection and integration of health facilities for transitioning from the humanitarian bodies to the Local Government service delivery system. These should be incorporated into the beneficiary Local Government budgets and Development plans.
- vii. Mainstreaming Results-Based Financing (RBF) into the Intergovernmental Transfers System: In addition to the current input-based financing for decentralized health services, Government has continued to embrace Results Based financing as a new financing modality for health service delivery. Government continues to understudy the effects of this financing reform before adoption in other sub programs. Accounting Officers are therefore, required to properly budget for these funds in accordance with the guidelines from the Ministry of Health.

In addition, Local Governments should within their workplans program for Performance Improvement Plans (PIPs) in order to ensure improved service delivery.

## Timely Submission of Performance Contracts (Form B)

- **76.** In line with PFM Act 2015 (as amended), Accounting Officers are required to submit their Performance Contract on a timely basis, as one of the requirements to renewal of the role of an Accounting Officer and to commence Budget Execution for the following financial year. Accordingly, Accounting Officers are advised as follows:
  - i. Ensure that, the Budget Performance Contract for FY 2024/25, which includes the annual and quarterly work plans, are submitted to this Ministry not later than **Friday 28th June 2024**, using the issued Budgeting Template on the Programme Budget Budgeting System (PBS);
  - ii. Note that, an extract of the Performance Contract should be submitted to the relevant Program/MDAs to confirm the consistency between the work plans and the Grant Guidelines issued; and
- iii. Note that, no funds for FY 2024/25 shall be released to any Vote whose Accounting Officer has not complied with the requirement on submission of the Budget Performance Contract for FY 2024/25.

#### F. CROSS CUTTING ISSUES

#### HIV/AIDS Mainstreaming

77. All Accounting Officers are instructed to allocate 0.1% of their total Government of Uganda budget (excluding pension & gratuity and transfers) for various HIV&AIDs interventions as per the HIV&AIDS mainstreaming Guidelines issued by Uganda AIDS Commission. HIV / AIDS mainstreaming activities and related cost should be captured under budget output Code 000013.

## Gender and Equity Budgeting

78. Section 9(6) of the PFM Act 2015 requires the Minister of Finance, Planning, and Economic Development to certify that MALG budgets are gender and equity responsive in consultation with the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC). As you finalize the budget estimates for FY 2024/25, Accounting Officers should illustrate inclusiveness in access, participation, and benefits from public goods and services by all men and women of all ages; persons with disability; and all income groups.



**79.** All MALGs should submit a copy of the detailed Budget estimates to EOC for assessment and issuance of the certificate of gender and equity compliance by 8<sup>th</sup> March 2024.

## **Environment and Climate Change**

- **80.** In line with Section 9(6)(a) of the Public Finance Management Act 2015 (as amended), Section 30 of the Climate Change Act, 2021 and the National Environment Act 2019, all Government Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) should mainstream Environmental and Climate Change Issues in the detailed budget estimates for FY 2024/2025.
- 81. This Ministry created the Climate Change and Climate Adaptation Budget Outputs in the PBS in order to ensure effective budgeting for climate change. You are reminded to mainstream climate change in your work plans and Budgets mainly under the recurrent budget

## 82. You are further reminded to:

 Mainstream clear interventions for environmental conservation, climate change mitigation and adaptation in your budgets;

 Develop workplans with clear environment and climate change outputs and outcomes to facilitate the monitoring of implementation of the identified interventions;

iii. Allocate sufficient resources to facilitate the implementation of the identified environment and climate change interventions.

#### **Nutrition**

- **83.** Growing concerns surround nutritional issues across the country, particularly with the revelation that only 15% of children aged 6 months to 2 years in Uganda are adhering to the minimum acceptable diet standards, measured by diversity and frequency.
- 84. Accordingly, I strongly encourage the respective sub-programs of Health, Agriculture, Water, Education, Social Development, and Trade to plan, budget and execute measures aimed at alleviating the challenges associated with food security and under-nutrition as stipulated in the Uganda Nutrition Action Plan II 2020/21-2024/25 which presently stands as the primary factor contributing to the prevalence of stunting in our society. In addition, the Office of the Prime Minister is required to follow up and provide the necessary technical support.

#### Tuberculosis (TB)

**85.** Following the discussions and recommendations made during the 6<sup>th</sup> Annual TB Conference in December 2023, it was found out that this highly infectious disease is on the rise in many Districts today. As you plan and budget for FY 2024/25, please ensure you allocate some resources to align all MDAs with the broader goal of ensuring equitable access to TB screening, prevention, treatment and care by leaving no one behind.

### Malaria Mainstreaming

- **86.** Uganda ranks 3rd in the global malaria burden and 7th in overall global malaria-related deaths. At the national level, it is the leading cause of hospital outpatient attendance and admissions and the second leading cause of death.
- 87. Furthermore, over 95% of the country is endemic for malaria. In 2023 alone, the country reported 15.8 million cases and 4161 deaths. Seven regions including West Nile, Acholi, Lango, Teso, Karamoja, Bukedi, and Busoga known to have moderate to high transmission, contributed to over 50% (8.6 million) of the national malaria case count and 42% (1,783) of all deaths. Domestic funding for malaria is approximately 1.1% (USD 1.4 million) which is not adequate to sustain its activities.
- **88.** All Accounting Officers are, therefore, required to mainstream malaria in their respective work plans and budgets. Please, ensure the following:
  - i. You undertake work place malaria control screening;
  - ii. Avoid stagnant waters as breeding places for mosquitoes;
  - iii. Routine fumigation, targeting indoor residual spraying
  - iv. For extraction industries (public works), do not leave gaps for malaria breeding, for example gravel or hard core extraction holes.
  - v. Cities, Municipalities and Town Councils are urged to MCs unblock their drainage systems to remove blocked culverts and drainages. Malaria smart sectors.
- **89.** Going forward, the Ministry of Health and this Ministry will work together to provide a specific line is indicated in the Chart of Accounts for this purpose. The Ministry of Health has also developed guidelines for MDA to mainstream malaria, please follow the link; <a href="http://library.health.go.ug/communicable-disease/malaria/guidelines-mainstreaming-malaria-multi-sectoral-national-and-district">http://library.health.go.ug/communicable-disease/malaria/guidelines-mainstreaming-malaria-multi-sectoral-national-and-district</a>.



#### G. TIMELINES AND REMINDERS

## Observance of Budget Preparation Timelines

- **90.** A number of Votes persistently submit their Budget Documents late contrary to the timelines stipulated in the PFM Act 2015 (as amended), ultimately affecting the required timely analysis and submission of the documents to Cabinet and Parliament. You are reminded to adhere to the timelines in this circular.
- **91.** All Votes that encounter technical challenges during finalization of the budget for FY 2024/25 should timely seek for support from my Ministry in writing.

#### **Detailed Budget Estimates**

92. Section 13 (3) of the PFM Act 2015 requires that Detailed Budget Estimates are presented to Parliament by the 1<sup>st</sup> of April for Parliament's approval and appropriation by the 31<sup>st</sup> of May. Therefore, all Accounting Officers should prepare and submit their Detailed Budget Estimates for FY 2024/25 to this Ministry by 28<sup>th</sup> February, 2024 for consolidation and submission to Parliament, in line with Section 10 (4) of the Public Finance Management Regulations, 2016.

#### Ministerial Policy Statements

- 93. Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) should prepare and submit their respective Ministerial Policy Statements (MPSs) for FY 2024/25 to Parliament by 8th March, 2024. In order for my Ministry to ensure consistency between the Detailed Budget Estimates, the Ministerial Policy Statements, the Medium-Term Expenditure Framework (MTEF) allocations and Government priorities, all MDAs should submit a hard and soft copy of their respective Policy Statements for FY 2024/25 to this Ministry by 8th March, 2024.
- 94. Section 13 (7) of the PFM Act, 2015 requires the Minister of Finance, Planning and Economic Development to present the proposed Budget Estimates in Parliament accompanied by a Certificate of Compliance of the annual budget of the previous year issued by the National Planning Authority. Accounting Officers should submit copies of the following documents for review and issuance of the Certificate of Compliance, to the National Planning Authority (NPA), by 8th March 2024:

i. Approved Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDA) Strategic Plan (2024/25 - 2028/20);

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- ii. MDA BFPs for FY 2024/25 2028/29;
- iii. Ministerial Policy Statements (MPS) for FY 2024/25;
- iv. Annual Performance Reports for FY 2022/23; and
- v. MDA Project Specific Progress Reports for FY 2023/24
- 95. All ministries are reminded that the structure of the MPS has not changed and in line with **Sections 13 (15) (a)-(i) of the PFMA, 2015 (Amended),** every MPS shall contain the following:
  - i. The achievements of the vote for the previous financial year;
  - ii. The annual procurement plan of the vote;
  - iii. The annual recruitment plan of the vote;
  - iv. A statement of the actions taken by the vote to implement the recommendations of Parliament in respect to the report of the Auditor General of the preceding financial year;
  - v. The cash flow projections of the vote;
  - vi. A certificate issued by the Minister responsible for Finance in consultation with the Equal Opportunities Commission certifying that the policy statement is gender and equity responsive and specifying measures taken to equalize opportunities for men, women, persons with disabilities and other marginalized groups;
  - vii. Vehicle utilization report; and
  - viii. The asset register of the votes in the format issued by the Accountant-General.

#### **Performance Contracts**

- **96.** All Local Government Accounting Officers are reminded and guided as follows:
  - i. Ensure that, the Budget Performance Contracts for FY 2024/25 are submitted to this Ministry not later than **Friday 14<sup>th</sup> June 2024**, using the Template in the PBS; and
  - ii. An extract of the Performance Contract should be submitted to the relevant Program/MDAs to confirm the consistency between the work plans and the Grant Guidelines issued.

#### H. CONCLUSION

- **97.** All Accounting Officers are required to adhere to the guidelines stipulated in this circular and the requirements of the Public Finance Management Act 2015 (Amended).




