Conducted media campaign against pornography through local radios. The Minister of State for Ethics and Integrity (MSEI) and PCC members participated in the radio campaign in Teso, Sebei, and Kigezi. The Chairperson PCC conducted a radio campaign in West Nile while she was addressing the Annual Broadcasters Conference in Arua.

Conducted sensitization of secondary school students on the dangers of pornography and sexual immorality in Gulu and Adjumani. A team of Facilitators together with the PCC members participated in the exercise. A total of 16 school were covered, 8 in Gulu and 8 in Adjumani

Held meetings with Cultural Leaders from Bunyoro, to strategically utilize Kingdom structures to fight pornography. The meeting was held in Bunyoro Kitara Kingdom with the Prime Minister and his Cabinet for purpose of ownership.

The PCC members participated in the Annual Broadcasters Conference organized by the UCC. PCC was given opportunity to address the Conference in Arua, Jinja, Masindi, and Kampala.

Fees for five staff on a Masters' program (Applied Ethics) at Makerere University were supported. Records Management Training was organized. Principal Human Resource Officer attended a Human Resource Audit in Mbabane, Swaziland.

Under Management of salary, pension and Gratuity, staff received their salaries and pension by 28th of every month. Budgeting for pension and salaries for FY 2017/2018 was accomplished and there is adequate funding for salaries, pension, and gratuities for this financial year.

Performance Management: With Performance Management, DEI performed very well during the FY 2015/2016. All staff received very good reports. A final report was submitted to the Ministry of Public Service and Evaluation workshop was conducted in Dec 2016. Report on Staff Performance assessment for FY 2016/2017 will be ready soon.
