- Spiraling inflation in the Republic of South Sudan has distorted the spending targets and reduced the real value of funds released to the Embassy.
- Insecurity in the country still curtail the mission's efforts of extending services to Ugandans in living areas outside Juba.
- Low level of staffing in the Mission; The Embassy currently has got only 3 home based staff amidst enormous tasks to be accomplished.
- Insecurity in the entire country. The efforts of the Mission to offer consular services as one of its core functions is often hampered by widespread insecurity in South Sudan.
- -External factors like reluctance by our host government to respond on the requests made. This makes the Mission look as if it does not perform yet actually the cause is from another Government.
- High rental costs for the Chancery and staff accommodation.
