The CET will retain a provision for sensitive products attracting tariffs about the maximum 35%.

In order to overcome challenges with valuation, global price distortions and other issues, it was recommended that EAC adopts the ad valorem mechanism for valuation but maintains specific rates of tariff as an alternative in exceptional cases.
