Complaints mechanism

Using funding mainly from DGF, the Commission accomplished the following;

- 249 (161 male, 88Female) complaints of Human Rights Violations registered in the 10 regional offices; Central (20), Arua (32), Fortportal (27), Gulu (45), Hoima (17), Jinja (8), Masaka (22), Mbarara (22), Soroti (24), and Moroto (32) respectively
- A total of 111 complaints were registered by adults and 78 youth.
- 317 nature of violations were recorded in the 10 regional offices (Arua, Central, Gulu, Hoima, Jinja, Masaka, Mbarara, Moroto, and Soroti) with 100 records of Torture, 83 child maintenance and 71 on personal liberty among others
- A total of 186 complaints were fully investigated
- 64 Complaints were mediated
- 31 complaints were concluded through the tribunal process
- A total of 30 referred complaints were followed up by UHRC in the different institutions for remedies

- UHRC also participated in different exhibition to engage with the public on different service of the Commission like the Budget week, Tax week, JLOS Open days.
- The Commission also celebrated International day in support to torture victims, Human rights day, and world press freedom day
