Challenges recorded during the reporting period.

- I. The Outbreak of COVID-19 in March 2020 affected budget performance of non-wage recurrent expenditure since most planned activities that involved travel inland; workshops and seminars as well as meetings were not implemented.
- II. Dependency on donor support for planned activities and targets whose release was irregular resulted in overall under performance since the work plan integrated activities of development partners
- III. Inadequate staff structure and uncompetitive pay of staff was the caused of inadequate capacity for the commission to deliver some services in the reporting period.
- IV. Case backlog; The UHRC backlog cases increased largely as result of fewer Commissioners in place and the delayed appointment of the Chairperson
- V. Inadequate Transport equipment particularly the old and obsolete fleet of vehicles was another major challenge in the quarter that affected various activities particularly in the regional offices
- VI. Due to the outbreak of COVID-19 virus, the Commission observed a changing trend of human rights violations that required the immediate actions of UHRC but was constrained due to the President's directives and Ministry of Health guidelines on the matter that restricted movement of public officers.

Performance highlights for the Quarter

Achievements shown below were realized by the UHRC with funding from the GoU and external support from Development Partners: DGF, JLOS and GiZ

ENHANCED OBSERVANCE OF HUMAN RIGHTS AND ACCOUNTABILITY.

I. The UHRC registered a total of 152 complaints (86Male, 66Female) from the 10regional offices through walk-ins, community awareness meetings (baraza) and toll-free lines. A total of 883 (536Male, 347Female) complaints were referred to other institutions that could best handle them including: Police, Judiciary, Anti-Corruption Court and IGG.

II. The UHRC fully investigated 45 complaints and files were prepared and forwarded for tribunals hearings. Hoima region had the highest number of complaints fully investigated with 13 complaints followed by Soroti with 12 complaints. Mbarara, Moroto and Arua regional offices did not

have a single complaint fully investigated.

- III. As means of providing quick redress to vulnerable persons especially mothers, the UHRC through ADR-mediation resolved 17 cases during the period. Most of the Complaints were in regards to child maintenance and family neglect.
- IV. A total 166 respondents of various complaints were registered; with Uganda Police Force (UPF) taking lead with 71 respondents representing 42%, followed by Private Individuals with 53 respondents representing 31%, then the Uganda Peoples Defence Forces (UPDF) with 24 respondents accounting for 14% among others.
- V. The UHRC re-installed its toll-free lines as a means of taking services closer to the community. A total of 711 callers (535Male,176 Female) reached the UHRC toll-free lines for various reasons; 256 were seeking update of their files, 347 were seeking legal advice and the others reported human rights violations. Majority of the callers, that is 204 of whom 129 were male, came from Hoima regional office.
- VI. In an effort to further take services closer to the people, 7 legal aid clinics were conducted within four regional offices of Central, Hoima, Gulu and Soroti. These attracted 820 community members of whom 656 were male and 164 females. The clinics were conducted within the community of Buswaka Trading Centre, Kyaterekera Sub County, Kagadi District and Prisons facilities of Mwera government prison, Magara government prisons (all male prisons) in Mityana district and Agago prison in Agago District.

ADEQUATELY INFORMED AND AN EMPOWERED CITIZENRY THAT PARTICIPATES IN GOVERNANCE

- I. The UHRC reached out a total of 12,125 community members (6,974Male, 5,151 Female) through 76 community baraza in 32 districts. This was done in 7 baraza and 21 baraza. The communities acquired knowledge of human rights particularly on early child and forced marriages among others.
- II. The UHRC traversed various parts of the country having stop overs in 83 trading Centers/towns through the mobile civic education road shows attracting 4,525 people (2,778Male and 1,747Female). They acquired knowledge on human rights, issues of child maintenance, Cultural rights, among others.
- III. In the same way, men who suffer domestic violence were equipped with knowledge on how to handle such cases and report them to the relevant authorities.
- IV. The UHRC disseminated a total of 6,650 IEC material to the public during civic education engagements across the regional office. These IEC materials included Posters (1,300), Flyers (800), T-shirts (1,050) and Your Rights magazines (3,000)
- V. The UHRC reached out to 270 students (134 Male, 136 Female) through the Human rights Peace Clubs in 30 Secondary schools in 3 regional offices of Hoima, Masaka and Jinja. The human rights and peace clubs were engaged through internal Human rights debates in order to create Human rights awareness with a theme General Elections in Uganda are regular, free and fair'
- VI. The UHRC had an interaction with 102callers (67 Male, 35 Female) who directly engaged through an interactive 20 radio talk shows across 6 regional offices.
- VII. The UHRC continued to engage the community through 815 radio spot messages and 20 radio talk shows aired out across various radio station in different languages.

UHRC TRAININGS AND DIALOGUES CONDUCTED

- I. The UHRC through Moroto regional office conducted a training for 76 Uganda Wild Life Authority (UWA) officials who acquired knowledge and skills on mandate of UHRC, concept of human rights, state obligation in protection and promotion of human rights, basic human rights standards of law enforcement, and implications of Prohibition and Prevention of Torture Act 2012.
- II. The UHRC through Soroti Regional Office conducted 02 dialogues with community and opinion leaders on advocacy against Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) in Kween district. A total of 337 members of the community acquired skills on the mandate of the UHRC, Concept of human rights and the law against FGM. The community members agreed to work towards elimination of FGM in their communities.
- III. In a bid to ensure sustainability of advocacy against FGM in Sebei sub region, the UHRC through Soroti regional office trained 124 community members that comprised of former FGM surgeons and mentors, elders, youths, among others as ant FGM champions in their communities. These were drawn from the districts of Bukwo, Kween and Kapchorwa.
- IV. Furthermore, UHRC through the Soroti Regional Office conducted a dialogue with cultural, traditional and religious leaders on charting a way forward for elimination of FGM. The custodians of culture were engaged with a view of coming up with an alternative rite of passage for girls from childhood to womanhood to replace FGM.
- V. To deal with the complacency in enforcement of the Prohibition of Female Genital Mutilation Act 2010, the UHRC through its Soroti Regional

VI. Office built capacity through training of 54 police detectives in enforcement of the Act. The detectives were drawn from Kapchorwa, Bukwo and Kween Districts.

ECONOMIC, SOCIAL AND CULTURAL RIGHTS PROMOTED

I. The UHRC monitored the right to health situation in 23 health facilities including; 2 Hospitals, 3 HCIV, 12 HCIII and 6 HCII in Gulu and Fort Portal Regional Offices.

IMPROVED STATE COMPLIANCE WITH INTERNATIONAL, REGIONAL, AND NATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS OBLIGATIONS

- I. In assessing the standard of living and welfare of prisoners and suspects in detention facilities, the UHRC inspected 139 detention facilities including 53 Police stations, 59 Police Posts and 27 Prisons within 6 regional offices.
- II. The UHRC carried out data collection on various thematic areas across the 10 regional offices for the Annual report.
- III. The UHRC conducted a Universal Periodic Review (UPR) meeting for key stakeholders aimed at taking stock on progress made by government in implementing recommendations arising from the 2016 Universal Periodic Review. It was attended by 35 stakeholders (22male, 13 female) and made various recommendations to inform the national report.
- IV. The UHRC monitored the oil and gas activities in the areas of Nwoya in Gulu and Kikuube in Hoima district. The finding on both sites revealed that there was no East African Crude Oil Pipeline (EACOP) activities on going in the districts pending negotiations intended to harmonize the existing legal framework.
- V. The UHRC also observed that the oil deposit was discovered near the Murchison falls National Park where homes were far away and as such, community members were not affected in terms of land for expansion or acquisition for the oil and gas project. This has greatly improved the relationship of the camp with the community members because there were no land wrangles or issues expected since the land upon which the oil was discovered is government owned.
- VI. The UHRC also monitored the Tea and sugar plantations within Hoima regional office including; McLeod Russel (U) Ltd (Muzizi Tea Estate located in Kagadi district, the tea factory has sister tea factories of Bugambe, Ankole, Mwenge and Kiko as confirmed by the UHRC.

STRENGTHENED UHRC SYSTEMS

- I. The UHRC strengthened capacity of 25 staff (25male,13 female) and acquired knowledge about human rights to be able to protect and promote human rights effectively; to provide knowledge and skill in developing human rights complaint programs that take into account human rights based approach to development principles and to share knowledge and experience from each other in order to improve on the planning, development of programs, response to human rights protection and promotion through use of best practices.
- II. Induction and Orientation was conducted for newly appointed staff of Kasese and Bundibugyo Field Offices in order to introduce them to the new roles and responsibilities.
- III. Skills enhancement in Performance Management to all staff was provided to all staff in 10 regional office.
- IV. The UHRC updated critical software (Operating System and Antivirus); Upgraded hardware; maintained and serviced printers and scanners; Trained users on new features of the operating system and office suite software. This was carried out by the Systems Unit in all the ten regional offices. Besides, the UHRC paid fixed Internet bills to UTL, Internet bundles for Field Offices and senior staff members as well as landline and Mobile Telephones of staff.
