### Performance highlights for the Quarter

For Quarter one (Q1) FY 2020/21, the Ministry's performance highlights under the key result areas are provided as follows:

#### 1. PROMOTION OF COMMERCIAL AND ECONOMIC DIPLOMACY

- i. Registered 70 Ugandan fish exporters with Saudi Food and Drug Authority for eligibility to export in the Saudi market.
- ii. Followed up outstanding trade and economic issues with 02 Counties: Algeria and DR Congo.
- iii. Participated in two (2) virtual Diaspora meetings: the 4th Uganda Netherlands Business Convention (UNBC), and 32nd Uganda North America Convention (UNAA) and Trade and Investment Forum. During these meetings, information on immigration issues and Uganda's investment opportunities was shared.
- iv. Coordinated the development of a policy paper on the challenges against market access for Uganda goods into Kenya; and recommended on the way forward. Recommendations were also provided on ways of improving Uganda's economic interests with Saudi Arabia.
- v. Coordinated the preparation of a cabinet submission on the construction of selected roads in eastern DRC to facilitate increase in bilateral trade.

#### 2. PROMOTION OF REGIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL PEACE AND SECURITY

- i. In September 2020, the AU and UN made a proposal to Uganda to operationalize the strengthening of African capacities to manage and resolve conflicts by prepositioning vehicles and equipment at the UN Regional Service Centre in Entebbe (RSCE), to reinforce the regional African Standby Force arrangements. This further cements the presence and offers opportunities for expansion of the RSCE in Uganda.
- ii. Participated in the 27th Meeting of the Technical Support Committee for Peace, Security and Cooperation Framework for D.R Congo and the Region.
- iii. Strengthened and consolidated Uganda's political relations at international level through facilitating bilateral meetings with Ambassadors of 06 countries(UK, EU, Iran, Sweden, Russia and China); Preparation and presentation of statements during National Days of 2 Countries (China and South Korea); and attending of farewell events for Ambassadors of 4 countries (Germany, Netherlands, Iran and Rwanda). iv. Coordinated Implementation of UN Peace and Security Council Resolutions on the 03 Countries: South Sudan, DR Congo and DPR Korea.
- v. The Uganda's 2nd implementation Report of UN Sanctions on DPR Korea was finalized and submitted.

#### 3. MOBILISATION OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND CAPACITY BUILDING OPPORTUNITIES

- i. Secured a fully-fledged Heart Medical Institution valued at \$4million to be delivered in the course of the current FY 2020/21.
- ii. Hosted 01 Joint Ministerial Commission with Egypt, which agreed to establish a 4 Mega Watts Solar power station in Busitema. In July 2020, Uganda received 36 containers of 40ft each containing solar power equipment in fulfillment of the offer of the Egyptian Government iii. Sourced 20 Science based scholarships from Hungary following the signing of relevant scholarship cooperation agreement/MoU. More 93 training offers were also received from the various countries such as Singapore, India, and Kenya, Ethiopia, Switzerland, Pakistan, India, and Russia
- iv. Facilitated the completion of Busoga International Polytechnic (to be opened in January 2021), and the laying of grounds for the construction of a polytechnic in Karamoja, and construction of a convention and exhibition Centre in Kampala. These projects were donated by the Emir of Sharljah, UAE.
- v. The IGAD Heads of State and Government met on 14th July 2020 and agreed to the adoption of Regional Guidelines on Harmonization and Facilitation of Cross Border Transport Operations across the Region in preparation for gradual and sequenced deconfinement and reopening of the air space between Member States. They also called upon the international community to work closely with Member States to support the IGAD Secretariat in the implementation of the Food Security Response component as affected by COVID-19, Desert Locusts and Floods and within the framework of the IGAD Regional Response Strategy.

#### 4. COOPERATION FRAMEWORKS/AGREEMENTS

i. Coordinated the Bilateral Agreement between Uganda and the DRC on the Sustainable Management of Fisheries Resources and Aquaculture in Lakes Edward and Albert Basin where the DRC finally communicated its approval of the Agreement allowing it to enter into force.

ii. Other 06 agreements & MOUs on political, economic and social matters were negotiated (05) and signed (01) with various countries.

#### 5. PROMOTION OF UGANDA'S IMAGE ABROAD

- i. Prepared 04 periodic reports to International & regional human rights mechanism. These included; the International Convention Against Torture to the United Nations Human Rights Committee; International Convention on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR) to the United Nations Human Rights Committee; UNAIDS Global Report on the impact OF COVID-19 lockdown on Human Rights and AIDS; and African Union Commission – Women, Gender and Development Directorate.
- ii. Supported Ugandan two (2) candidatures: Judge Dr. Julia Sebutinde re-election to the International Court of Justice, and Mr. Bemanya Twebaze for Director General of African Regional Intellectual Property Organisation (ARIPO).

The IGAD Heads of State and Government met on 14th July 2020 and agreed to the adoption of Regional Guidelines on Harmonization and Facilitation of Cross Border Transport Operations across the Region in preparation for gradual and sequenced deconfinement and reopening of the air space between Member States. They also called upon the international community to work closely with Member States to support the IGAD Secretariat in the implementation of the Food Security Response component as affected by COVID-19, Desert Locusts and Floods and within the framework of the IGAD Regional Response Strategy.

In September 2020, the AU and UN made a proposal to Uganda to operationalize the strengthening African capacities to manage and resolve conflicts by prepositioning vehicles and equipment at the UN Regional Service Centre in Entebbe (RSCE), to reinforce the regional African Standby Force arrangements. This further cements the presence and offers opportunities for expansion of the RSCE in Uganda.

The Ministry continued to seek support for two (02 Ugandan candidatures: Justice Julia Sebutinde for re-election as Judge of the International Court of Justice, and Mr Bemanya Twebaze for election as a Director-General of the African Regional Intellectual Property Organization (ARIPO).
