Performance highlights for the Quarter

The following are the highlights of the performance of the first quarter;

A. Crop Resources

- 1. The Ministry launched the National Organic Policy at Headquarters and regional dissemination activities will be conducted in the subsequent quarters. MFPED issued a Certificate of Financial Implication for the National Sanitary and Phytosanitary Policy awaiting approval by Parliament. Reviewed and submitted the National Tea Policy to the Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development for a Certificate of Financial Implication.
- 2. The Ministry promoted 3 value chains of Macadamia, Hass avocado and Cashenut in eastern Uganda through creating an enabling environment for the private sector under the MOU arrangement.
- 3. The Ministry in collaboration with experts from DLCOEA, FAO and NARO continued with control activities for the desert locusts in Sebei, Teso, Lango and Karamoja sub regions.
- 4. The Ministry managed to contain the Maize Lethal Necrosis to less than 1%; controlled the spread of the Fall Army Worm from greater than 50% to less than 10%; reduced the incidences of the Banana Bacterial Wilt to 3%. This was through routine pest and disease surveillance, operationalisation of 52 mobile plant clinics in the eastern and northern region and registered 32 agro-chemical dealers and 33 agro-chemicals. 44% of the beneficiaries were youth, women and People with Disabilities
- 5. The Ministry conducted routine inspection and supervision of horticulture premises in the Wakiso, Kampala and Mukono. Undertook mandatory supervision and inspection of the exist points at Malaba, Entebbe International Airport, Mutukula and Katuna.
- 6. The Ministry through Agriculture Cluster Development Project signed matching grants for 75 agreements with a total value of worth UGX 28 billion, of which UGX 18.8 billion (\$5.1 Million) was Government of Uganda contribution. 43% of the beneficiaries were youth, women and People with Disabilities
- 7. The Ministry continued to demonstrate the use of ICT to increase efficiency in distribution of inputs such as fertilisers through the e-voucher system. So far, 205,556 farmers had been enrolled on the system across 57 districts. 40% of the beneficiaries were youth, women and People with

8. The Ministry recruited and deployed 983 community facilitators to strengthen mobilization of farmer groups and their capacity building to participate in the e-voucher scheme.

B. Animal Resources

- 1. The Ministry drafted the principles for; Livestock Identification Traceability bill, Breeding bill, meat bill and Animal disease bill.
- 2. Initiated the procurement of 2.311 million doses of Foot and Mouth Disease Vaccines, 500,000 doses of CBPP vaccine, 1,000,000 dozes of PPR, 700,000 doses of Rabies, and 200,000 doses of Blanthrax and 5,000 litres of eprinomectrin acaricides for livestock disease control. 60% of the beneficiaries will be youth, women and People with Disabilities.
- 3. The Ministry conducted animal disease surveillance and regulation activities in disease hot spot district of the cattle corridor. 43% of the beneficiaries were youth, women and People with Disabilities.
- 4. Initiated the construction of two holding grounds Nshaara and Rehengere to support the private sector that are engaged in the sale of high-end beef products.
- 5. The Ministry issued 213 animal movement permits in order to control diseases and procured and issued 175 cattle traders license for the export for the export animal products.

C. Fisheries

1. The Ministry, through the Fisheries Protection Unit undertook 600 enforcement operations to enforce sustainable fisheries rules and regulations along the major water bodies. 40% of the beneficiaries were youth, and women

The Ministry licensed 3,500 fishing vessels (40% of the beneficiaries were youth, women and People with Disabilities) and 7,550 fishers in an effort to reduce illegal fishing activities along the major water bodies.

- 2. The Ministry initiated procurement of 1,500,000 fingerlings and 750,000 kgs of fish feed for distribution to fish farmers to promote aquaculture. 50% of the beneficiaries will be youth and PWD.
- 3. The Ministry continued activities of controlling Kariba weed along the major water bodies and also managed to clear 45 ha of heavy moving masses of the floating Island.

D. Infrastructure Services

- 1. The Ministry constructed and rehabilitated 89 valley tanks with a capacity of 15,000 cubic meters each in the Eastern, Central and Western Regions and continued with the construction of the remaining 3 valley dams (10% level of completion). 42% of the beneficiaries were youth, women and People with Disabilities
- 2. The Ministry supported farming households to clear 3,749 acres of farm land and opening of 227 kms of farm roads using the deployed heavy earth moving equipment. 30% of the beneficiaries were youth, women and People with Disabilities
- 3. The Ministry continued with the construction and rehabilitation of the regional and referral mechanization centres and so far, Agwata and Buwama regional mechanization centres are at 75% level of completion, Namalere referral Mechanization workshops is at 30% level of completion.
- 4. The Ministry completed designs for construction of two additional regional mechanization centres in Kiryadongo and Mbale districts and construction works have been initiated.

E. Extension Services

1. The Ministry continued to mobilise Village Agent Model (VAM) in order to enhance value chain development in the agricultural sector in view of the existing gap between the extensions: farmer ratio. The Ministry trained a total of 1,711 village agents, traders and extension staff across the country.

QUARTER 1: Highlights of Vote Performance

- 2. The Ministry updated the list of the recruited agriculture extension workers to facilitate planning and coordination of the extension activities at the district local governments.
- 3. The Ministry piloted the e-diary system which is used to up-raise extension workers in Ntungamo and Kalungu districts and trained 859 extension workers in central and northern regions on the use of the E-diary.

F. Support Services

- 1. The Ministry continued to prioritize establishment of the necessary regulatory framework to support the development of the Agriculture Sector. The progress on policies includes: revised the genetic resources for food and agriculture policy; finalised and presented the livestock policy and veterinary services policy to Top Policy Management; validated the Animal Drug Policy; Agro-chemicals control, Agro-equipment control and fertiliser regulations have been submitted to Solicitor General for certificate of legal implication; Sanitary and phyto-sanitary policy (SPS) submitted to cabinet for approval; drafted the principles of the Veterinary Drug Authority Bill;
- 2. The Ministry conducted profitability analyses for the 17 priority commodities as specified in the real economy versus vulnerable economy.
- 3. The Ministry developed the Agro-industrialisation Implementation Action Plan and shared it with stakeholders. 60% of the participants were youth, women and People with Disabilities
- 4. The Ministry develop Agricultural Sector guidelines for utilisation of the sector grants to the District Local Government.
- 5. The Ministry coordinated the Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Program (CAADP) regional meeting to validate the Joint Sector Review Action Plan. The Ministry coordinated the High-Level Virtual Forum on the CAADP 2nd Biennial Review Report for the East African Community Region.
