Performance highlights for the Quarter

- 1) Continued to engage the Iranian Government as Uganda being one of the beneficiary countries of Iran's new policy to undertake/invest in commercial agricultural projects abroad to feed its growing population by encouraging Iranian companies to invest in Uganda.
- 2) Continued to engage Pakistan, Iraq and Azerbaijan authorities on Investment opportunities in Uganda. A working trip in Pakistan was organized to meet Pakistan officials and businessmen but was postponed because of travel restriction as a result of the COVID pandemic.
- 3) Visited Qom Province and provided various consular services to the Ugandans community including the students
- 4) Facilitated the return of stranded Ugandans and Returning residents as a result of the COVID pandemic from the Islamic Republic of Iran, Pakistan, Afghanistan and Iraq.
- 5) The Embassy did not issue visas because it has not yet been facilitated to handle electronic visa issuance. Follow-up through Ugandan MOFA has not yet achieved results. Nevertheless, a number of Iranians were helped to obtain visas to Uganda for both tourism and business purposes through the e-visa process
- 6) Planned visits to Mazandaran Province meant to interest various companies to undertake trade and investment ventures through the respective Chambers of Commerce were put on hold due to travel restrictions due to the COVID pandemic.
- 7) Followed-up on the promoting and marketing of Ugandan Tea and Coffee in Iran. Aysan Khavarimianeh Kala Co. despite the ongoing challenges, has continued to import coffee from Uganda with 40MT during the reporting period.
- 8) Engaged Arman Parto Paydar Co. regarding resumption of tea imports from Uganda into Iran. They promised to resume trading, since travel restrictions had been eased.
- 9) Facilitated the safe return of 2 Uganda women who were being held under duress in Iraq
