- Gratuity amounting to Ugx. 754,598,281 was not paid out due to incomplete or delayed submission on the part of the claimants.
- 2. Development budget

Ugx. 630,000,000 for the Purchase of a Vehicle pending conclusion of the procurement process. The releases on Development budget exceeded the initial approved budget by Ugx. 100,000,000 resulting from the permission granted to the Ministry to re allocate funds from non-wage recurrent under the item of workshops & seminars to finance the shortfall on vehicle purchase.

#### Performance highlights for the Quarter

In the Second Quarter (Q2) FY 2020/21, the Ministry's performance highlights under the key result areas included the following:

#### PROMOTION OF REGIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL PEACE AND SECURITY

- 1. Coordinated Uganda's participation and decisions at the following eight (08) Regional and International engagements aimed at promoting, among others, Regional Peace and Security.
- i. The 49th Foreign Ministers meeting of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) in Niamey. In its Final Declaration the meeting commended the stabilization efforts of the Africa Union Mission in Somalia (AMISOM) and called on the international community to provide financial and logistical support to the Somalia Security Forces to enhance security in the country. Uganda is a leading troop contributor to AMISOM.
- ii. Engagement with UN Security Council members leading to Resolution 2556 (2020), which among other things, noted that the elimination of the threat posed by armed groups like ADF requires an integrated regional approach and strong political engagement by the DRC, SADC and the Great Lakes region. It also welcomed the renewed commitments of the DRC and its neighbors including Uganda to work together to tackle insecurity in Eastern DRC and to promote long lasting regional development expressed during the recent Quadripartite meetings and Goma Summit.
- iii. The 38th Extraordinary Assembly of IGAD Heads of State and Government was held on 20th December 2020 in Djibouti, which in its Final Communique noted the commendable progress in South Sudan and urged the Parties to faithfully and fully implement the provisions of the Revitalized Agreement on the Resolution of the Conflict in the Republic of South Sudan (R-ARCSS).
- iv. The online summit convened by President of the DRC, HE Felix-Antoine Tshekedi Tshilombo on 7th October 2020 the outcome of which was a Final Communique where the Heads of State agreed to; set up a cross-border plan to strengthen surveillance and control measures in response to Covid-19 and other pathologies; combine efforts to eradicate the negative forces and armed groups operating in the Great Lakes Sub-Region and also consolidate cooperation and exploration of economic opportunities including facilitation of cross-border trade and infrastructure.
- v. The meetings of the High Level Legal and Policy Experts, as well as the Ministers responsible for Livestock and Pastoral Development in IGAD Region to Review and Validate the Roadmap for the Implementation of the IGAD Protocol on Free Movement of Persons in the IGAD Region; 16 17 November 2020. The meetings endorsed the roadmap.
- vi. The ICGLR Heads of State and Government Summit held virtually on 20 October 2020. The Summit reviewed the security and COVID-19 situation in the region.
- vii. The 7th session of Joint Technical Committee (JTC) of the Republic of Uganda and the Republic of South Sudan on demarcation of the Uganda South Sudan border, November 2020.
- viii. The 14th Extra Ordinary Session of the Assembly of the African Union on the Silencing of the Guns; 06 December 2020.
- 2. The Ministry also prepared responses to UN Group of Experts on 3 country situations: South Sudan, DPRK, and DRC

#### PROMOTION OF COMMERCIAL AND ECONOMIC DIPLOMACY

- 3. Participated in the 13th Extraordinary Session of the Assembly of the African Union on the Start of Trading Under the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA). The Assembly took stock of the progress made in the negotiations, and agreed to launch the start of trading under the AfCFTA commencing on 01 January 2021.
- 4. Participated in 01 business forum meeting with H.E Alemtsehay Meseret, Ambassador of the Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia to review the state of play in the implementation of the outcomes of the Third Session of the Joint Ministerial Commission (JMC) between the Republic of Uganda and the Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia. The meeting agreed to promote the export of, Sugar, diary and dairy products, etc, from Uganda to Ethiopia.
- 5. Explored and engaged with the Algerian authorities on the export of Uganda's powdered milk to Algeria.
- 6. Participated in three (3) virtual Diaspora meetings during which, information on immigration issues and Uganda's investment opportunities, among others was shared. The meetings included:
- i. Uganda-U.A.E Virtual Convention held from 21-22 October 2020.
- ii. Uganda Diaspora Japan 1st Virtual Convention on 8th November 2020.
- iii. Uganda Diaspora Agri-Business Investment Day E-Conference and Award on 21st November 2020. During the conference, the Ugandan youth also showcased their projects to diaspora investors to promote partnerships between diaspora and youth agri-entrepreneurs in Uganda.

#### MOBILISATION OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND CAPACITY BUILDING OPPORTUNITIES

7. Secured 15 training offers from the following countries; -Nigeria, India, UNITAR, Switzerland, Finland, Singapore, Russia, Pakistan, Japan, Azerbaijan & Egypt.

#### COOPERATION FRAMEWORKS/AGREEMENTS

- 8. Concluded 05 Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs)/Agreements as follows:
- i. Establishment of a Joint committee for cooperation between Uganda and United Arab Emirates.
- ii. One Host Country Agreement signed between Uganda and MasterCard Foundation.
- iii. 03 bilateral negotiations between Uganda and DRC, Nigeria, and Ghana to facilitate Uganda Airlines to make commercial flight services in accordance with the Bilateral Air Services Agreement (BASA) between Uganda and the respective countries.

#### PROMOTION OF UGANDA'S IMAGE ABROAD

- 9. The Ministry successfully coordinated the campaign for support of five (05) Ugandan candidatures in the international system that include:
- i. Justice Julia Sebutinde as Judge of the International Court of Justice (ICJ);
- ii. Mr. Bemanya Twebaze as Director General of the African Regional Intellectual Property Organization (ARIPO);
- iii. Amb. Solomon S. Rutega as Director General of Inter-Africa Coffee Organization (IACO);
- iv. Dr. Ahmed K. Sengendo as Assistant Secretary General of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC); and
- v. Mrs. Caroline Nalwanga Magambo to the UN Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions (ACABQ).
- 10. The UN General Assembly on 30th December 2020 approved US\$1.41 million for the share of Special Political Missions in the budget of the Regional Service Centre in Entebbe, Uganda. This decision further cements the presence and work of the RSCE in Uganda.
- 11. Disseminated 35 Press releases about the Ministry activities.
- 12. Organized 20 Media appearances/Interviews/Articles in traditional media (Print, TV, and Radio) on Foreign Policy issues.
- 13. Made 5 supplements on the Ministry's work

- 14. Facilitated the presentation of 05 letters of credence by Ambassadors of USA, Netherlands, Japan, Saudi Arabia, UK.

- 16. Organized 01 farewell luncheon for the outgoing High Commissioner of South Africa.

- ii. The 49th Foreign Ministers meeting of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) in Niamey. In its Final Declaration the meeting commended the stabilization efforts of the Africa Union Mission in Somalia (AMISOM) and called on the international community to provide financial and logistical support to the Somalia Security Forces to enhance security in the country. Uganda is a leading troop contributor to AMISOM.
- iii. Engagement with UN Security Council members leading to Resolution 2556 (2020), which among other things, noted that the elimination of the threat posed by armed groups like ADF requires an integrated regional approach and strong political engagement by the DRC, SADC and the Great Lakes region. It also welcomed the renewed commitments of the DRC and its neighbors including Uganda to work together to tackle insecurity in Eastern DRC and to promote

Coordinated Uganda delegation participation and decisions at three (03) regional engagements: i. The IGAD Heads of State and Government meeting held on 14th July 2020. The Heads of State agreed to the adoption of Regional Guidelines on Harmonization and Facilitation of Cross Border Transport Operations across the Region in preparation for gradual and sequenced de-confinement and reopening of the air space between Member States. They also called upon the international community to work closely with Member States to support the IGAD Secretariat in the implementation of the Food Security Response component as affected by COVID-19, Desert Locusts and Floods and within the framework of the IGAD Regional Response Strategy. ii. The 38th Extraordinary Assembly of IGAD Heads of State and Government was held on 20th December 2020 in Djibouti, which in its Final Communique noted the commendable progress in South Sudan and urged the Parties to faithfully and fully implement the provisions of the Revitalized Agreement on the Resolution of the Conflict in the Republic of South Sudan (R-ARCSS).

iii. The online summit convened by President of the DRC, HE Felix-Antoine Tshekedi Tshilombo on 7th October 2020 the outcome of which was a Final Communique where the Heads of State agreed to; set up a cross-border plan to strengthen surveillance and control measures in response to Covid-19 and other pathologies; combine efforts to eradicate the negative forces and armed groups operating in the Great Lakes Sub-Region and also consolidate cooperation and exploration of economic opportunities including facilitation of cross-border trade and infrastructure.

The Directorate successfully coordinated the campaign for support of three (03) Ugandan candidatures in the international system that include: Justice Julia Sebutinde for re-election as Judge of the International Court of Justice (ICJ), Mr

In addition to the US\$37,159,200 budget approved by the UN General Assembly in June 2020 for the Regional Service Centre in Entebbe (RSCE), the UN General Assembly on 30th December 2020 approved US\$1.41 million for the share of Special Political Missions in the budget of the Regional Service Centre in Entebbe, Uganda. Earlier on, in September 2020, the AU and UN made a proposal to Uganda to operationalize the strengthening of African capacities to manage and resolve conflicts by prepositioning vehicles and equipment at the RSCE, to reinforce the regional African Standby Force arrangements. These decisions further cement the presence and offers opportunities for expansion of the RSCE work in Uganda.
