#### Matters to note in budget execution

Quarter two report for the Financial Year 2020/2021 focused on the human and financial capacity of NEMA to strengthen performance of its mandate and statutory functions. NEMA's approved budget for the FY 2020/2021 is Ugx 25,555,655,669 (Twenty-Five Billion Five Hundred Fifty-Five Million Six Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand Six Hundred Sixty-Nine) only. In quarter one and two, NEMA received a total of Ugx 9,089,882,323 (Nine Billion Eighty-Nine Million Eight Hundred Eighty-Two Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-Three) only, and spent Ugx 8,704,976,854 (96% absorption).

The variance of Ugx 160,044,046 in wage was as a result of some vacancies that had not been filled eg. The position of Finance Manager, Principal Environment Inspector (Engineering), Senior Environment Inspector (Chemical Processes) etc. The variance of Ugx 152,711,337 on non-wage recurrent was mainly as a result of NSSF contribution of position not yet filled, insurance, unpaid rent of regional offices and allowances for travel inland.

All outputs had not been achieved as planned for quarter 2, mainly due to COVID-19 pandemic that affected the quarterly releases and further impacted on the ability for staff to carry out environmental outreaches, enforcement activities, restoration, among others due to strict adherence to MoH-SOP guidelines

### Performance highlights for the Quarter

Q2 shown NEMA, resilience to coordinated, supervise, monitor and regulate all environmental management issues across the country. During this time, the Board and NEMA Management supported the newly established cities on how to build sustainable cities and ensure inclusive participation of all stakeholders in building and securing cities that can provide employment, housing and services, but also ensure green initiatives are promoted such as clean and safe water, green spaces for absorbing emissions caused by increase in car traffic or industries, waste management and improvement of markets. It should be noted that, the quarter also experienced limited face to face engagement with stakeholder and citizens due to the current Covid-19 measures/SOPs by MoH. This has led to reduced participation of stakeholders in meetings/barazas organised by the Authority, but also the gender aspect of attaining balanced participation in decision making and technical meeting.

However, the compliance and enforcement relatively remained high due to the number of environmental audits and licences issued by NEMA by December 2020 (Q2). The current environmental problems the country is facing are still occurring with more impact felt at district and community level. High level of deforestation was reported in West Nile during the reporting period. The district/cities still continue to experience challenges of limited funding due to increased coverage of area of work, and cost of undertaking numerous environmental enforcement and compliance work.

Review of the Lead agency compliance assessment tool, Section 33(9) of the National Environment Act 2019 (9) requires the Authority to issue a certificate of compliance to a lead agency which effectively executes its functions under the Act. A meeting was organized to scrutinize and review the tool that will be used in assessing agencies. A total of 12 officers participated of which three (03) were females while nine (09) were male. The reviewed was subjected for input and endorsement by both respective line ministries and all lead agencies. Forty (40) plastic manufacturing Facilities in the districts of Kampala and Wakiso were inspected and of the 90% of the facilities inspected for producing plastic carrier bags (Kaveera), 45% of the facilities assessed had recycling units. Among the polyethene manufacturer's, recycled material is mostly used in the production of construction sheets, multipurpose polythene bags and plastic carrier bags. It's therefore difficult to trace the manufacturer in the event that such a product becomes wastec) Ongoing plans to collaborate with the Ministry of Water and Environment with support from GIZ are under way to implement a PET Plastic Waste Partnership. This will improve the sustainable management of plastic waste in Greater Kampala through developing an inclusive green recycling sector.

During Q2, 26.4% of activities were focused on community policing and led to 25 meetings conducted, to address the high rate of person arrested 22 persons/entities for violating environmental laws and 25 persons/entities degrading the wetlands around Kampala City, Wakiso district, Gomba district, Lira City, Mbarara City and Sheema district. It should be noted that, music concerts dropped to 3.6% by December 2020 from 14.8% in FY2019/20 during this current reporting time. This drop has been contributed by the curfew measures that are still imposed by Government due to Covid-19 on music concerts that attract large gatherings or bars that would play loud music which would become a public nuisance.

121 activities compared to 295 in Q1 were activities undertaken by the EPF-NEMA and these included noise pollution, wetland/lakeshore degradation, community policing, enforcement of restorations orders, violations of EIA conditions of approval and regulation of environmentally violating activities such as music functions and events among others.

Key issues identified were that enforcement efforts undertaken by EPF in Adjumani districts in the protection of the afezelia and shea butter trees have let to reduction of cutting down of the trees. There is sustainable management of wetlands as a result of sensitization in most of the districts; however, few people are still encroaching on the wetlands. Partnership with NGOs such as CARE-Uganda, World Vision, Lutheran Federation, Ecotrust among others have contributed to demarcation of wetlands. For example, Hoima district has planned to gradually demarcate all wetlands within the district. Tree nursery beds have been established in various areas of Hoima to increase on the number of exotic trees and other indigenous trees as a result of NEMA's intervention. Sensitization by NEMA on environmental management has also been beneficial in creating awareness among the communities, and to build the

development, of which during the quarter 2, the following regulations have been concluded and due for dissemination: The Air quality regulation 2020, Oil Spill Preparedness and Emergency Response Regulations 2020, the National Environment (Environmental Impact and Social Assessment) Regulations 2020, the National Environment (Standards for discharge of Effluent into Water or on Land) Regulations 2020. Drafting of national guidelines on biodiversity and social offsets are ongoing to guide the country on implementation of projects that may require offsetting of areas of biodiversity importance.
