- 1. The prevalence of COVID-19 Pandemic continued to affect implementation of some of the planned activities including hosting of Multilateral and Bilateral Cooperation engagements.
- 2. In the course of the quarter, the Ministry received approval on internal re-allocation to facilitate additional subvention to Pan African Women Movement, acquisition of a modern telecommunication system as well as computers and printers, and purchase of furniture for key operation offices of accounts and procurement.
- 3. The following accounts registered low funds absorption by the end of the quarter:
- i. Pension amounting to Ugx. 1,190,650,433 was pending verification of the relevant beneficiaries, especially foreign pensioners.
- ii. Gratuity amounting to Ugx. 665,393,332 was not paid out due to incomplete or delayed submission on the part of the claimants.
- iii. Ugx 300,000,000 on ICT equipment was pending conclusion of the procurement process for the purchase of a modern telecommunication system, computers and printers.

QUARTER 3: Highlights of Vote Performance

Performance highlights for the Quarter

In the Third Quarter (Q3) FY 2020/21, the Ministry's performance highlight under the key result areas was as follows:

PROMOTION OF REGIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL PEACE AND SECURITY

- iii. Somalia. The outcome was a resolution re-authorizing the mandate of AMISOM until 31st December 2021. The Council called on the UN Secretary General to continue to provide a logistical package to AMISOM.

- ii. The AU Peace and Security Council Ministerial meeting on Somalia on 9th February 2021. The outcome was agreement on a common approach to the new mandate by the UN Security Council for AMISOM.
- iii. The EAC Summit on 27 February 2021. At the summit Justice Geoffrey Kiryabwiire and Justice Richard Muhumuza were elected to the East African Court of Justice.
- iv. IGAD institutional capacity building workshop on Mediation, Conflict Prevention, Dialogue and Peace Building; 2nd -4th March 2021.
- v. The IGAD scientific conference on Migration & Displacement; 22nd -24th February 2021.
- vi. The 12th meeting of the IGAD Drought Disaster Resilience and Sustainability Initiative (IDDRSI) Platform Steering Committee; 18th -19th March 2021.
- vii. Regional bilateral training by Inter-Governmental Authority (IGAD) for non-state actors (media and CSOs) on the threat and impacts of human trafficking and migrant smuggling 22-25th March 2021.

The leaders issued a joint statement on the COVID-19 pandemic and steps to take to fight the pandemic and support each other in broader global efforts.

v. The 49th Foreign Ministers meeting of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) in Niamey. In its Final Declaration the meeting commended the stabilization efforts of the Africa Union Mission in Somalia (AMISOM) and called on the international community to provide financial and logistical support to the Somalia Security Forces to enhance security in the country.

In addition to the US\$37,159,200 budget approved by the UN General Assembly in June 2020 for the Regional Service Centre in Entebbe (RSCE), the UN General Assembly on 30th December 2020 approved US\$1.41 million for the share of Special Political Missions in the budget of the Regional Service Centre in Entebbe, Uganda. Earlier on, in September 2020, the AU and UN made a proposal to Uganda to operationalize the strengthening of African capacities to manage and resolve conflicts by prepositioning vehicles and equipment at the RSCE, to reinforce the regional African Standby Force arrangements. These decisions further cement the presence and offers opportunities for expansion of the RSCE work in Uganda.

The Directorate also coordinated meetings with senior NPA officials to develop a comprehensive plan to support the retention and expansion of the RSCE. The plan will also be a guide to attract and support other regional and international organizations to locate in Uganda.
