Matters to note in budget execution

- Due to the recent recalls of the Head of Mission and one other Senior Officer, the Mission is currently suffering a staffing gap that needs to be addressed urgently.
- In order to receive the expected new Head of Mission and send back the recalled Financial Attaché, the Mission will require a supplementary budget.
- The cost of living in South Africa has continued to rise yet the Mission's budget ceiling has remained the same. This requires urgent attention.
- The Representational Vehicle already hit the boarding-off mileage and it requires urgent replacement while the deputy Head of Mission has got no official vehicle thus using the Utility Van which cripples the functioning of the Mission.
- With the little capital development release this financial year 2021/2022, some parts of the Official Residence that were in a dire state have had minor maintenance and routine repairs undertaken on them but in general, the Official Residence requires a major renovation in order to keep it going for more years.
- Covid -19 Lockdown affected implementation of most of the planned activities.
- The roof of the Chancery is old and leaking. This has caused the supporting timber underneath to rot. The roofing tiles are also old. There is urgent need for funding to re-roof the Chancery.
