Matters to note in budget execution

QUARTER 2: Highlights of Vote Performance

- Covid 19 pandemic disrupted the calendar of meetings and activities.
- Low staffing levels currently standing at 1+7. The Mission is accredited to cover the UN office and other International Organisations based in Geneva. In a snap shot the coverage involves 33 International Organisations, of which 23 are Intergovernmental organisations and 8 UN agencies. Additionally, the Mission covers 250 Non-Governmental Organisations headquartered in Geneva as well as responsible for the Bilateral relations with Switzerland.
- Several competing critical committees that meet concurrently throughout the year making it impossible to participate in critical meetings to make critical inputs to defend and communicate Uganda's positions on various issues hence the need to review the structure of the mission to ensure availability of staff to cover all critical committees.
- High costs of living compared to the non-competitive remuneration rates in form of allowances/salaries. The situation has been exacerbated by the Covid 19 global pandemic which has witnessed sky rocketed commodity prices.
- High rent expenditure can be substituted with long term strategy of buying property. If Uganda wants to continue being part of the Community of Nations, then it will have to maintain an Embassy in Geneva for good and this calls for timely planning.
- Arrears in payment of assessed contribution fees to South Centre and WTO, IOM resulting in Uganda being placed under administrative measures including loosing of voting rights and shaming. This is negative publicity for the country's image.
