Performance highlights for the Quarter

A Legal Task Force meeting was held, and the Principles for the Proceeds of Crime Law were reviewed and validated. A Stakeholders' meeting is scheduled for the 4th Quarter, so that their views on the Principles of the Law can be obtained. A Cabinet Memorandum is being prepared, to submit the draft Principles to Cabinet for approval.

• Dissemination of Anti-Corruption Laws and the Zero Tolerance to Corruption Policy was carried out to Political Leaders, Religious Leaders, Public Officers, CSOs and Special Interest Groups in

i) Buliisa, Masindi and Kiryandongo Districts in Eastern Uganda.

ii) Amuria, Kepelebyong and Serere Districts in Eastern Uganda.

• A meeting of the Steering Committee for implementation of the ZTCP was held on 15th March 2022. The Strategy of Enhancing Social Accountability was discussed, as well as how to obtain funding for implementation of the Strategy.

• An Accountability Platform of DIPF was established in Budaka district. Among the assignments it will handle include monitoring expenditure of Community Groups in the implementation of the Parish Development Model (PDM) program.

• Follow up and support supervision was conducted in 4 Districts to strengthen the DIPF operations. This was done in Hoima, Masindi,

Kiryandongo and Busia. The DIPFs were supported to re-strategise accountability issues from the Parish Development Model Program.

• One regional inspection and performance review was conducted with the Anti-Corruption Coalition of Busoga (ACCOB). ACCOB was supported to develop Work plan responsive accountability issues in the implementation of the PDM.

• One IAF meeting chaired by the Hon. MSEI was conducted. The meeting was also attended by Hon. Minister for Economic Monitoring. IAF members agreed to resume their joint Monitoring activities. They agreed to work with Minister for Economic monitoring when carrying out joint activities. This is aimed at fighting corruption and improving service delivery.

• In line with development of RFO data base, 550 filled questionnaires were collected from the districts of Pallisa, Budaka, Bugweri, Tororo, and Busia. A report on the exercise was prepared.

• Met with over 75 leaders of Religious and Faith Organisations in the districts of Mubende, Busia, Budaka, Kiryandongo and Mityana in March and discussed their role in the rebuilding of morals and fighting corruption, especially while implementing Programme 18 of NDPIII. Particular

attention was given to the Parish Development Model.

• Concerns of the participants were addressed and questions answered.

• The Parish Development Model and how it can be supported by RFOs was discussed and a way forward was agreed.

• The National celebration for St. Janani Luwumu day commemoration was held at Kololo airstrip with 200 guests in attendance. Her Excellence as the Vice President of the Republic of Uganda was the Chief Guest, representing His Excellency the President. His Grace Dr. Stephen Kazimba Mugalu, the Archbishop of the Church of Uganda was the main celebrant.

• There was another celebration held at Wii Gweng, Kitgum district, attended by over 4,000, including 8 Bishops from the Church of Uganda and the Catholic Archbishop of the Archdiocese of Uganda and 5 members of parliament from the area. This took good care of a representation of the masses from the local population in the Lango and Acholi sub-regions.

200 people, representing all sections of the target audience for such a national function, gathered at Kololo airstrip for the national celebration.
Over 4,000 people gathered at Wii gweng, Muchwini, Kitigum district.

• During the organizing committee meetings, the COU presented its plan to the DEI for the development of the site in Kitgum into a tourist attraction and for other learning and business centers.

• The Kyamula Church of Christ, Salama Road, Makindye division case of alleged gross office abuse by a one pastor John Musisi, said to have connived with other people from outside Church, to fraudulently sell off the Church land and property that had existed for 30 years. This was handled after being referred to the Hon. Mister of State for Ethics and Integrity.

• A joint meeting with the accusing and accused parties' representatives together with the State House Anti-Corruption Unit and the deputy RCC was held. There were several other meetings held. Appropriate advice was given to stakeholders.

As a result of the engagements;

• The demolitions of the Church structure and forceful evictions were halted to give room for due process of law.

- The reportedly life-threatening impending danger was averted.
- The members of the Church continued worshipping.

• Conducted a stakeholders' engagement meeting on government efforts in the fight against corruption and moral decadence in Busia District. The meeting included representatives from Busia District Local Government Political and Technical team, Civil Society Organisations, Religious and Faith Organization leaders, Cultural Leaders and the Media.

• There was an in-depth dialogue on the drivers of corruption in Uganda and stakeholders suggested measures to address the vice more practicallyby engaging all stakeholders at various levels.

• Conducted a Radio Talk Show at Open Gate Radio, Mbale District. There was wide media coverage on the DEI activities through various media houses including NBS TV, Radio One (90.0fm), Radio 2 Akaboozi Ku Biri (87.9fm), Kfm (93.3fm), Jojo FM Busia, Mboona FM Mityana District and the New Vision Newspaper. The Talk show was quite interactive and attracted the locals to call in and share their views on the fight against corruption and moral decadence in Uganda. The Religious and Faith Organization Leaders used the media platforms to denounce corruption and moral decadence in their respective regions.

• Disseminated the National Anti-Corruption Strategy (NACS), Zero Tolerance to Corruption Policy and National Ethical Values Policy among stakeholders in Busia, Tororo, Butaleja and Budaka Districts. The stakeholders, especially district officials were appreciative of the IEC Materials. They committed to use the materials to sensitize their stakeholders at various forums.

Attended a virtual Resumed 12th Session of the UNCAC Implementation Review Group held from 6th - 10th September 2021 in Vienna, Austria. A status report on these engagements was produced. The 9th Session of the Conference of States Parties (COSP) took place from 13th -17th December 2021 in Sharm El-Sheikh, Egypt. Uganda Delegation was headed by the Minister for Ethics & Integrity. The delegation included the IGG, the Head of Anti-Corruption Unit, and Officers from the Office of the Auditor General, Directorate for Ethics & Integrity, Inspectorate of Government and State House Anti-Corruption Unit. The Conference adopted resolutions such as strengthening international cooperation among State Parties, removing barriers in asset recovery and provision of technical assistance to States Parties, especially Developing States.

In line with development of RFO data base, Data collection was carried out in the Acholi sub region districts of Gulu, Kitgum, Lamwo, Pader, Agago, Amuru and Nwoya for the Anglicans (COU), Born gain/Pentecostals, Catholics, Muslims and Seventh Day Adventists. During Q2, Data collection for development of RFO database was conducted. Data collection was carried out in only 7 out of the planned 20 districts. Data was collected from RFOs found in the districts of Gulu, Kitgum, Lamwo, Pader, Agago, Amuru and Nwova. In Ouarter three, 550 filled questionnaires were collected from the districts of Pallisa, Budaka, Bugweri, Tororo, and Busia. Representatives from DEI met and discussed with several RFOs leaders in the districts of Jinja, Mubende Mityana and Iganga. The Subject was roles religious leaders can play in promoting government programs, fighting corruption, rebuilding morals and values, and sensitizing the public on COVID 19 pandemic.

Met with over 75 leaders, including some from Religious and Faith Organisations, in the district of Busia, Kiryandongo, Budaka in the month of March and discussed their role in the rebuilding of morals and fighting corruption, especially while implementing Programme 18 of NDPIII. Particular attention was given to the Parish Development Model.

There was another celebration held at Wii Gweng, Kitgum district, attended by over 4,000, including 8 Bishops from the Church of Uganda and the Catholic Archbishop of the Archdiocese of Uganda and 5 members of parliament from the area. This took good care of a representation of the masses from the local population in the Lango and Acholi sub-regions. 200 people, representing all sections of the target audience for such a national function, gathered at Kololo airstrip for the national celebration. Over 4,000 people gathered at Wii gweng, Muchwini, Kitigum district. During the organizing committee meetings, the COU presented its plan to the DEI for the development of the site in Kitgum into a tourist attraction and for other learning and business centers.

This was handled after being referred to the Hon. Mister of State for Ethics and Integrity. A joint meeting with the accusing and accused parties' representatives together with the State House Anti-Corruption Unit and the deputy RCC was held. There were several other meetings held. Appropriate advice was given to stakeholders. As a result of the above engagements, The demolitions of the Church structure and forceful evictions were halted to give room for due process of law. The reportedly life-threatening impending danger was averted. The members of the Church continued worshipping.

This took good care of a representation of the masses from the local population in the Lango and Acholi subregions. 200 people, representing all sections of the target audience for such a national function, gathered at Kololo airstrip for the national celebration.
