The High Commissioner, emphasized the agricultural nature of Uganda where organic tea and coffee are found and that Uganda would be most grateful if Pakistan imported these and other goods where Uganda has got a comparative advantage. He further requested the president to assist Uganda in adding value to its products.

- -The head of the African desk raised concern about the insecurity in Kampala.
- -The secretary pointed out their dissatisfaction with the position of Uganda about the Kashmir issue.
- -Importation of Ugandan products (tea, coffee beans among others).
- -The secretary assured the ambassador that they would offer more scholarships to Ugandan students beginning with the next academic year more so in agriculture, engineering and dental surgery.
- -About the insecurity Kampala, both the secretary and the Head of the African desk offered to give military training to Ugandan military personals so as to tighten the security more so in urban terrorism.
- -About the Kashmir issue the Ambassador assured the team that he would forward the same to the minister of foreign affairs of Uganda for further discussion.
- -Importation of Ugandan products; the Head of the African desk said Pakistan is importing coffee and tea from Uganda. In the year 2020 Pakistan imported Uganda Coffee worth 20 million dollars per month, while in the year 2021 it was worth 33 million dollars per month. He implored the high commissioner to encourage Ugandans to grow more organic tea and coffee because of the high demand in Pakistan.

Presentation of credentials in Pakistan The high commissioner of Uganda to Pakistan Mr. Muhammad Tezikuba Kisambira, presented his credentials to His Excellency, Dr. Arif Alvi the President of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan Coordinated the visit of a delegation from the Azerbaijan State Agency for Public Service and Social Innovations under the President of the Republic of Azerbaijan

The delegation discussed the implementation of the Memorandum of Understanding on the establishment of a progressive mechanism of public service delivery which was signed between the above-mentioned agency and the Ministry of Public Services of the Republic of Uganda on 21st September, 2018.

This MOU is of particular importance in the context of Sustainable Development Goals and the 2030 Agenda for the development of African countries, exemplary governance and socioeconomic progress.

During the visit, the Ugandan delegation was introduced to the Azerbaijan Service and Assessment Network (ASAN). ASAN is a state agency for public services to citizens of Azerbaijan. The agency's goal is to make services more easily accessible to citizens using modern technologies

The Ambassador thanked the Islamic republic Pakistan for opening a high commission in Uganda and promised to reciprocate.

Meeting with the secretary of foreign affairs of the Islamic republic of Pakistan Mr. Sohail Mehmood and head of the African desk Mr. Murad Wazir.

Ambassador Kisambira met with the secretary to the ministry of foreign affairs of Pakistan Mr. Sohail Mehmood and the Head of the African desk Mr. Murad Wazir and the issues below were discussed;

- The head of the African desk raised concern about the insecurity in Kampala.
- The secretary pointed out their dissatisfaction with the position of Uganda about the Kashmir issue.
- Importation of Ugandan products (tea, coffee beans among others).
- The secretary assured the ambassador that they would offer more scholarships to Ugandan students beginning with the next academic year more so in agriculture, engineering and dental surgery.
- About the insecurity Kampala, both the secretary and the Head of the African desk offered to give military training to Ugandan military personals so as to tighten the security more so in urban terrorism.
- About the Kashmir issue the Ambassador assured the team that he would forward the same to the minister of foreign affairs of Uganda for further discussion.
- Importation of Ugandan products; the Head of the African desk said Pakistan is importing coffee and tea from Uganda. In the year 2020 Pakistan imported Uganda Coffee worth 20 million dollars per month, while in the year 2021 it was worth 33 million dollars per month. He implored the high commissioner to encourage Ugandans to grow more organic tea and coffee because of the high demand in Pakistan.

He contended that there's need to secure a representative with in the shortest time possible. iii) The need to enhance Pakistan relations with Uganda from Political to commercial through opening up a liaison office in Pakistan aimed at promoting trade investment, Tourism as well as Education. iv) absence of Uganda in trade and tourism despite the thousands of Pakistan residents in Uganda.
