#### Matters to note in budget execution

Following a resolution of Parliament dated 09th September 2021, directing the Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development to merge the two budget data sets (MEMD & REA), the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Development (Vote 017) engaged MoFPED on the way forward. The Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development (MoFPED), managed to merge the GoU financial information from vote 123 with that of vote 017 in the Integrated Financial Management System (IFMS).

This left an incomplete process on the merger of the approved budget and project work plans in the PBS for the two votes. This anomaly has caused financial imbalances and mis-reporting on the combined approved budget resulting in the seeming "over expenditure" beyond the approved MEMD budget as explained in this PBS system detailed financial report.

There is also a problem of reporting on the draw-down of external financing resources since they are still being accounted for manually since they are not automated on the IFMS and is prone to erroneous reporting. The issues mentioned have caused unforeseen delays in the submission of the Quarterly reports for the FY2021/22.

An annex hard copy report for the REA projects has been attached hereto for additional notes on the projects implemented since not all the detailed work plans were not merged and hence could not be captured in the PBS report.

The other key challenges faced by all the three (3) MEMD programmes are: -

- i) Land Acquisition for government projects is taking a long time and a considerable budget. The major constraints have been slow resolution of challenges regarding land acquisition for the project sites. Whereas government has endeavored to avail funding, the following issues have caused delays to project works.
- a) Land/Property owners who demand for unreasonable compensation amounts, leading to protracted reviews. Some project valuation reports have had as many as six (6) reviews.
- b) Speculation and High Expectations Landowners and public engage in speculative practices when transmission line projects, petroleum and mineral projects are announced.
- c) Land acquisition delays have dire consequences that include cancellation of funding by development partners and failure to execute the much needed projects on time.
- ii) Vandalism on the transmission lines and other installations
- iii) Deemed energy costs arising from delayed completion of power transmission lines
- iv) Procurement bottlenecks especially lengthy bidding processes that require no-objections from the external financiers at each stage of execution.
- v) High power tariffs, which are not attractive to the manufacturing sector.
- vi) Illegal mining activities and operations affecting environment and revenues generated from mining operations
- vii) Lengthy and Protracted negotiations on taking the Final Investment Decisions for projects in the Oil and Gas sector.
- viii) Inadequate financing for development: investment in development projects such as Equity contribution in oil and gas investment projects.
- ix) The key emerging issues such as COVID-19 Pandemic.
- x) The problem of merging the two approved budget data figures from vote 123 to vote 017 after the rationalization of the two institutions and still being handled from the MOFPED on this matter. This has caused mismatches in the approved budget expenditure figures as reported in the IFMS and the PBS. xi) Tracking of the releases and expenditure for the External Financing is challenge since its not spend using IFMS. Therefore the updates on loan draw-downs are not easily available to the planners.

### **QUARTER 4: Highlights of Vote Performance**

#### Performance highlights for the Quarter

#### **Energy Development**

On the Electricity Amendment Act 2021, was passed by Parliament and assented to by HE The President. The Energy Efficiency and Conservation Bill 2021 to identify relevant energy efficiency and conservation strategies conducted and alignment to the NDP III undertaken. A paper on Umeme Concession was concluded awaiting presentation to Cabinet. The Mainstreaming process of the Agencies under the Ministry progressed with the proposed structure reviewed and agreed upon with the Agency and the Ministry of Public Service.

Consultations held with Total Energies and Kakira Sugar Limited for the establishment of a biofuels blending pilot was undertaken. Procurement of consultant to develop a national biogas strategy and action plan for Uganda concluded. Construction of the 4MW solar project at Busitema University completed and commissioned. Discussions held with Nansana Municipal Council for identification of beneficiaries and training of household in the use of ethanol for cooking. Procurement of consultancy firm to conduct waste flow surveys and characterization studies for the cities of Mbarara and Mbale was concluded. Four (04) solar water pumps were installed in Kasese and Bulambuli.

By end of Q4, the electricity generation capacity increased by 57MW, from 1,268.9MW as at the end of last Financial year to 1,346.9MW. This was due to the completion of the 42MW Achwa I, 14MW kikagati and 15MW Nyamugasani II. Other projects under construction are: Nyagak III reached 68%, the project is behind schedule, the strategic partner has not yet reach financial close and the GoU contribution releases are low. Karuma HPP 600MW as at June 2022 was with physical percentage progress of 99% and the financial percentage progress is 96.05%. The 44MW Muzizi was at financing agreement was terminated by MoFPED. The developer for Kiba 400MW completed technical feasibility studies. The feasibility studies for Ayago 840MW were updated. Pre-Feasibility studies for the rehabilitation of Nalubaale and Kiira Power stations were completed.

The transmission network increased from 3,100km to 3,385.56km as at end of the quarter 4 following the addition of the Karuma -Kawanda 400kv and Karuma - Olwiyo 132kv Transmission Line. The section for 132kv Karuma-Lira Transmission Line at 90%. The substation of Luzira is complete but commissioning awaits completion of the 15km, 132kV transmission line. A number of other transmission projects are at various stages of construction.

All district headquarters have been connected to the national electricity grid except Buvuma District, awaiting financial resources. Electricity connectivity was 57% to electricity on grid 19% and off-grid 38%). Following the resumption of the Electricity Connections Policy (ECP), Government connected about 10,000 clients since the receipt of some materials.

Supervised and supported the consultant to collect data from candidate site areas for Nuclear power development in the districts of Buyende, Nakasongola, Lamwo, Kiruhura; Data was also collected in Uranium mining target areas (districts of Sembabule and Buhweju). Follow-up field visits to public universities in Soroti, Busitema, Lira, Gulu to conduct needs assessment for CNST. Consultations were also conducted with various Ministries Department Agencies (MDA's) and other stakeholders.

#### Petroleum Development

Geological, Geochemical and geophysical surveys have been undertaken. Government acquired a total of 140 line-km of geophysical data and 297sq km of geological and geochemical mapping in Moroto-Kadam basin. The data so far collected covers a total area of approximately 928-line km of geophysical and over 4,321km2 of geological and geochemical data, representing approximately 75% of the entire Moroto-Kadam Basin. The second licensing round is in final stages of negotiations with the two remaining companies.

Following the enactment of the EACOP Act 2021, Government successfully facilitated FID for the EACOP and organized the FID ceremony on the 1st February 2022 at Kololo Independence Grounds. Chief Guest was H.E Yoweri Kaguta Museveni, the President of Uganda. Undertook review and evaluation of the excess Gas utilization proposals for Tilenga as well as developed a concept note on Country Gas utilization strategy. Held engagements with 2 potential investors; NEC-NORINCO JV and Global Gases. Participated in the EACOP Finance raising engagements with Financial Advisors, the Pathfinders.

The RAP disclosures have continued and cleared Compensation Agreements for PAPs in the Camp Yard areas for the EACOP. Over 71 PAPs paid in January 2022 and commenced Entitlement Briefings along the entire EACOP Corridor as well as Compensation Agreements signing for physically displaced PAPs along the ROW. Over 285 PAPs have signed Compensation Agreements

In the downstream petroleum supply, a total of 450 petroleum facilities monitored and inspected in various districts.26 petroleum retail outlets lined up for prosecution in the Albertine region. A total of 574,433,664 Litres imported of diesel, petrol and kerosene.

191,477,888 litres on monthly average were imported for diesel, petrol and kerosene for January-March 2022. Petroleum pump prices averaged UGX5097 (Diesel), UGX 4370 (Petrol) and UGX 3500 (Kerosene). One hundred sixty-six (166) Petroleum Operating Licenses were issued out including wholesale and retail, sixty-two (62) Completion Certificates and thirty-four (34) Petroleum Construction Permits were issued. Four (4) transfers were done. The licensing process is being implemented through the National Petroleum Information system .98.5% average compliance level to fuel quality monitoring of petroleum products in the quarter revealed cases of fuel dumping and adulteration.

Jinja Storage Tanks (JST) facility is being operated by UNOC through its partner (One Petroleum Ltd). 99% level of completion of J Mahathi infra U ltd project developments of the private Jetty of 70million litres storage facility at Bugiri Bukasa Wakiso District. The Jetty project is expected to be commissioned at the end of 2022. About 40 depots and mini depots were inspected and monitored in districts of Jinja, Budaka, Mbale Soroti, Lira, Kiryandongo, Kalungu, Mbarara, Wakiso and Kampala.

#### Mineral Development:

The Mining and Minerals Bill, 2021 passed into an Act in April 2022, awaiting assent by the President.

The Final draft of the ICGLR Regulations submitted to Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

The team participated in a meeting of the UN Group of Experts on DRC sanctions at Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Construction of Mineral

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Beneficiation Centre in Ntungamo District is now at 99% while at Fort Portal its 94% completion.

Recorded a number of earthquake events that happened in the Western Arm the rift. However data analysis is not complete due to faulty VPN that connects remote stations to Entebbe National Data Center (NDC). The geological exploration team made investigations on 19 sites around Kirwa Wolfram Mine, Kisoro District. The geophysics team undertook geophysical field investigations (gravity and magnetic measurements) over the area extending northwest of the Kirwa Wolfram Mine. Data interpretation is ongoing.

The ministry collected 143 soil and 8 rocks samples around Kirwa wolfram mine. The sample is being analysed to determine if the wolfram mineralization extends beyond the current mining area. Technical assistance on evaluation of marble resources in Kaboong continues to be provided;

Provided mineral information for investment promotion to an investor from India interested in iron ore resources on 17th February, 2022. National and Regional Mineral concession maps updated and produced. Updated mineral occurrence map produced. Conducted an awareness talk show on Tv on the new Mining & Mineral bill 2021. Held workshop on Regional Certification Mechanism (RCM). Had spot light initiation about wear of protection gear. Two (2) articles of Mining projects published in media. Seven (7) groups trained in value addition in use of minerals such as; Kaolin (making black board chalk), iron-ore (casting of local stoves), etc.

Government of Uganda contracted X-Calibur, a Spanish company to carry out Aerial Surveys of Karamoja Region to establish the mineral potential of the region. Data acquisition Phase 1 and Phase 2 . 100% Gravity data over Karamoja and Lamwo Phase 1 and Phase 2 completed. 97% of Magnetic and 97% Radiometric data acquired over Karamoja in Phase 1.

#### Geothermal

**Vote Performance Report** 

Two companies are currently licensed to explore for geothermal resources at Buranga and Panyigoro geothermal areas in Bundibugyo and Pakwach districts respectively. GIDS Consult (U) Ltd is operating a Retention License (RL) at Buranga geothermal prospect in Bundibugyo District, and Bantu Energy (U) Ltd is operating an Exploration License (EL) at Panyigoro geothermal area in Pakwach district. Staff undertook community sensitization in Pakwach District in preparation for TGH drilling.

GRD staff updated and refined the conceptual model of Panyimur geothermal prospect using information from MSc research findings of staff, who completed their studies at Kyushu University in Japan.GRD staff undertook review and interpretation of site-specific geological data for Ihimbo geothermal area in preparation for geological studies in the area. Work involved compilation of available site-specific geologic maps, geochemical and geophysical data, and identifying gaps to be filled.GRD staff undertook a reconnaissance survey of the Kanangorok geothermal area in Karenga District, Karamoja region. Preliminary findings suggest the presence of a working geothermal system at Kanangorok warranting further studies. The lithological logs of the TGHs at Kibiro were converted into graphic logs to facilitate correlation across lithologies in the different holes.
