### **QUARTER 4: Highlights of Vote Performance**

#### Performance highlights for the Quarter

This Report gives details of the activities that NEMA implemented during the Financial Year (FY) 2021/22. The reporting period continues to face to after effects caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Nevertheless, NEMA has continued to operate amidst budget cuts that affected over 80% of its activities to enhance compliance to environmental standards, environmental literacy and corporate image. However, the transition to total digitization of Environmental Social Impact Assessment (ESIA) operations within the Authority has seen an increase of ESIA related documents submissions from 1,873 in FY 2020/21 to 3,565 in FY 2021/22 into the Authority by June 2022. To improve service delivery to the citizens of Uganda, NEMA is committed to strengthening the review process and ensure sustainable utilization of natural resources, compliance and enforcement to the law/standards.

The Authority also observes a significant drop in its performance related to compliance enforcement and monitoring due to budget cuts. This will affect the already made progress in the last 5 years. No recovery of acreage was made however, site inspections and compliance monitoring of these sites show that majority of wetland catchments face the following among other; crop farming that is the fundamental underlying factor increasing degradation of the wetlands in this sub regions. The wetlands like Pece-Torchi pass through the tobacco growing areas of the mid-north and in some places tobacco farmers cultivate up to the riverbank. North Kiruruma Wetland System along the Kabale-Katuna Road paddocking for dairy farms, snagging, extensive cultivation, dams for watering of animals. Other developments in the wetland include the Katuna Border Export Zone under the Ministry of Trade Industry and Operatives. The Export Zone is located along the Kabale-Katuna Highway at a distance of about 15km from the Kabale Town. A warehouse has been established at the site, hence the need to continuous monitor the project to ensure compliance with the ESIA Conditions of approval. Infrastructural development in western Uganda also shows that majority of the ecosystems will have potential encroachment such as the proposed site lies upstream of the Mvumba Hydro power plant (at Nyagatare in Rwanda) and Maziba Dams (at Maziba in Uganda). The River is the main water source (reservoir) for these power plants. Therefore, wetland degradation in north and north eastern Uganda is contributed by the high level economic activities like agriculture, brewing - waragi distillation, which is a major accelerator of biodiversity loss, degradation and pollution of the aquatic species and water resources respectively. NEMA recommends undertaking full restoration processes of all the wetlands monitored, sensitization of the masses about the functions of the wetland regarding the roles of the community in the protection of the wetlands and Implementation o

Environmental planning at national and sub-national levels strengthened; Research function of the Authority promoted

A draft NSOER 2020 has been produced and submitted for technical review by Top Management and Board approval. O4 M&E activity was undertaken to evaluated the school projects supported by NEMA through Development partners- UNEP and Government of Japan. The areas of focus were the GKMA where four schools were selected. two of the schools were government -aided and two were privately owned schools. These included: St. Kizito Secondary School - Namugongo, Gayaza High School – Wakiso, St. Kizito Secondary School - Mbuya Parish Bugoloobi, Queen of Peace – Rubaga.

All school exhibited increase in student population after COVID-19 pandemic. Majority of the school indicated a 50% increase in students' enrolment. It was noted that school such as St. Kizito Secondary School - Namugongo has 100% transited to bioenergy production and consumption using biomass generated within the school. The school exhibited the implementation of Sustainable Development Goal 12 (SDG12) .Findings shows that all schools have gardens that support the students with vegetable growing such as cabbages, mushrooms, and bananas among others. Tree planting in schools was observed to give the ecological functionality.: Having a 5-year school Strategic Plan and linking them to all development frameworks such as the National Development Plans (NDP) III, Ministry of Education and Sport (MoES) Programme plans and ESD related activities are critical to ensure long term sustainability of projects that provide the schools additional benefits than only class work.

encroachment along the shore of Lake Victoria. NEMA received 1163 Environment Social Impact Assessment (ESIA)-related submissions, reviewed and approved 779 projects between April and June 2022. Rapid inspections were undertaken to address encroachment of fragile ecosystems such as wetlands, river banks and lake shore lines of Lake Victoria. Commissioned in 2019 and handed over to the government, the country's second largest hydro power dam (183.2 MW -Isimba Hydro Power Project, here after referred to as Isimba HPP has led to an increase of power generation for a period of 3 years. However, after commissioning a defects liability period that ended March, 2022 was given to ensure that most of the environmental and social concerns are addressed by the contractor. the Authority together with the other Lead Agencies (including Directorate of Water Resources Management and the District Local Government) undertook, monitoring compliance inspections of the plant and the findings shows that; outstanding issues of restoration especially of the Koova Island, water source protection and mitigation measures to address the issue of floating islands and water weeds.

There are over 539 defects, 338 defects closed while 202 remain pending, most of which included concrete leakages/seepages, broken signage and snags, among others. It was also noted that there were registered seepages in unit 4, that were being worked on, and the power house has an automated control room where all the operations of the power house are centered, including monitoring the power generation levels, intake and discharge of water, among

others. At the time of inspection, the readings in the control room indicated as below; total water discharge was at 1800 m<sup>3</sup>/s.

Development of the economic instruments for effective environmental management and particularly Oil and Gas in the Albertine Graben was undertaken particularly to review of the current charge system and propose new and commensurate fees, fines and penalties. The design will focus on identifying the policy options – gaps, assessing the cost of implementation that will guide the charge and pool rate as well as identify the potential to undertake stewardship, and capacity building for sustainability of the instruction.

The EPF undertook 706 operations in FY2021/22 out of 1,200 annual target. The 59% performance is lower than previous FYs due to post COVID-19 impacts on funding to the Authority. Out of the 706 operations undertake, noise pollution at 9.2%, enforcement activities to halt encroachment at 11%, provision of restoration orders at 28.2% and community sensitization meetings at 23% continue to be highly registered crimes by NEMA- EPF by end of June 2022 across the Greater Kampala Metropolitan Area (GKMA), these include, Wakiso, Mpigi, Mukono, Kampala, Entebbe, Kalungu and Masaka.

Functional support to policy framework development continued and led to the drafting and revision of regulations to align them to the NEA act 2019. One (01) set of regulation was reviewed/drafted, presented to the Technical Committee of the Board, and will be presented to the next stages for consideration. These include; the national environment (chemicals and chemical products control) regulations.

#### Reasons for Variation in performance

High impact monitoring was not funded for 3 quarters, however, it due to the nature of the compliance level required to follow up on dam infrastructure. NEMA had to undertake this activity within other inspections.

Tree planting in schools was observed to give the ecological functionality.: Having a 5-year school Strategic Plan and linking them to all development frameworks such as the National Development Plans (NDP) III, Ministry of Education and Sport (MoES) Programme plans and ESD related activities are critical to ensure long term sustainability of projects that provide the schools additional benefits than only class work.

The COPs recognized the need for public awareness of chemical pollution which is on the rise and identified the need relevant to NEMA undertaken; A National to prepare key guidelines and proposals as well as build synergies to ensure that critical threats to human health and the environment posed by hazardous chemical and waste are addressed. Secondly, NEMA and NPA also participated in the 8th Africa Regional BIOFIN dialogue from the 8th to 10th June 2022 in Zanzibar, Tanzania, where the region focused on how biodiversity in ocean and inland waters can stay afloat and ensure Africa stays afloat with the blue economy is to balance blue economy and biodiversity financing; and balance the approaches of blue and green economy targeting biodiversity and climate financing. Thirdly, the Authority participated in the 4th Open Ended Working group of the post 2020 Global Biodiversity Framework in Nairobi from 21st to 26th June 2022. The meeting continued from Geneva negotiations in March 2022 that saw the GBF undergo transformation with various sections still under brackets due to undecided delegates and uncompromised positions. Africa's

> concerns are to see priority and major inclusion on its decisions ad mechanism for advancing benefit sharing from the use of genetic resources. Governments/Parties have advanced the text in the GBF for final negotiations and conclusion will be adopted during the COP 15 to be held in

Montreal in December 2022

In Wakiso district, a reconnaissance for the restoration of Nabisasoro-Lubigi Wetland System was undertaken to identify area for the establishment of an enforcement camp and preliminary engagement of the community
