

DRAFTING LEGISLATION

The Ministry of Justice under its Directorate of First Parliamentary Counsel drafted and monitored the passage of several laws through Parliament. By the end of March, 2015, 10 Bills had been drafted, 11 Acts published; 34 Statutory Instruments and 13 Legal Notices and 01 ordinance.

PROVIDING LEGAL ADVICE

Spearheaded by the Directorate of Legal Advisory Services (DLAS); the Ministry also continued its mandate of provision of legal advice to Government Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) as well as review of contracts from various MDAs. In the reporting time, the Directorate received 948 contracts and MoUs for review and approval. The Directorate responded to 855 contracts and MoUs within the stipulated period of one week. The Directorate also received 116 requests for Legal Advice from Ministries, Parastatals and other agencies, out of which 89 were responded to and 27 are pending representing a performance of 77. A significant number of the requests received from MDAs lacked adequate supporting documents that partly explains why the performance in response to requests for legal advice is not at 100%. Furthermore, The Ministry as a whole participated in a number of East African Community and Common Market for East and Central Africa (COMESA) Legal Sector meetings.

Preparation of Memoranda, agreements for execution by the Attorney General, submissions and attending arbitration proceedings were also done by the Directorate of Legal advisory Services.

ADMINISTRATION OF ESTATES OF THE DECEASED

There was a drastic increase in demand for Administrator General's services and as such by the end of march, 2015 total of 3055 new files for clients had been opened out of an annual target of 4000 files representing performance at and an annual increase of 20%. This increment can be attributed to Increased sensitization of clients about the succession laws leading to their demand of rights. The Administrator General also inspected 40 estates and applied to court for 25 letters of Administration. In the same period, No estates were filed for winding up as the Administrator General encouraged clients to administer own estates, made 664 application to courts to grant Certificates of No objections, and 21 Land Transfers were successfully completed, 300 Family arbitrations and 280 Family mediations were also handled and concluded.

The computerization of the Administrator General's registry is still ongoing. Currently, computerization of the lands and accounts section is ongoing. The computerization process includes capturing of files, verification of files and capturing of data. Computer networking and collecting files from desk officers to

capture and verify data is still in the process.

DEFENDING GOVERNMENT

The Attorney General continued the mandate of defending Government in various Courts of law and Human Rights Tribunals; in the reporting time the attorney General concluded 32 cases out of which 24 cases worth 30.295bn and \$1.6M were won and 8 cases worth 4.662Bn were Lost.

Relatedly, The Ministry under its Directorate of Civil litigation (DCL) is leading a Recovery Program. The Directorate has started working with the Anti-Corruption Court to recover money and assets which court has ordered guilty parties to return to Government, in that regard a total of UGX 1.2Bn was recovered from National ICO insurance company and remitted to the Treasury.

The Recovery program/process includes the following set of procedures;

- 1.Getting instructions and information about the offenders
- 2. Carrying out Investigations
- 3. Seeking instructions
- 4. Identifying witnesses
- 5. Preparing pleadings
- 6. Filing Court Documents
- 7. Appearing in Court
- 8. Securing Court Orders
- 9. Commence in execution of proceedings
- 10.Recovery and or sale
- 11. Follow up recovery costs

These activities are carried out country wide.

REGULATION OF THE LEGAL PROFESSION

The Department of Law Council under its Disciplinary Committee concluded 130 cases against errant lawyers in 42 Sittings. The Department also inspected 38 Chambers /Law firms. Eight Universities offering law courses were also inspected as well as The Department also carried out research and consultations in various areas.

Some of the cases reported here are part of the Case Backlog and were completed with support in the from additional funding of UGX90 Million from JLOS.

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HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

In the current FY, Various posts were filled and they include; One (1) Principal Procurement Officer, One(1) Undersecretary, One (1) Stenographer Secretary and One (1) Accounts Assistant. Promotion of staff.

One (1) Economist was promoted to Senior Economist.

Staff transfers.

The Principal Procurement Officer was transferred to Ministry of Health. The senior Economist was transferred to Ministry of Finance planning and economic development.

Staff retired.

In the reporting time; Several staff also retired including the Under Secretary, Finance and Administration retired w.e.f 21st August, 2014. 1 Senior Office Supervisor Retired w.e.f 24th July, 2014 and One (1) Steno Secretary retired w.e.f 5th October, 2014.

DECONCETRATION OF MINISTRY SERVICES.

In the FY2014/15, the Ministry continued its policy of extending its services to other parts of the Country. In that regard, the construction of Moroto Mini-JLOS house was completed commissioned and occupied; the construction of Mbale regional office was completed, operationalised and occupied the construction of Moroto staff quarters was also completed and now occupied.

Preliminary 2015/16 Performance

Capital Budget

The Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs is grateful to Ministry of Finance Planning and Economic Development for the initial funding of UGX 720Million provided in the current Financial year under Project 1228: Support to Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs. These funds were used for the purchase of the much needed Ministers vehicles to help in supervision of State Attorneys to attend Court cases and next FY2016/17 funds will be used to purchase of Motor vehicles for regional offices.

Project 1242: Construction of JLOS House.

The project for construction of the JLOS house is being implemented through a public private partnership (PPP) and has reached the advance stages of procurement. The project does however requires continued, monitoring and due diligence. Evaluation of Bidders was undertaken and negotiations with the best evaluated bidder are on course. The actual construction is expected to commence in the FY2017/18 Realization of a JLOS house will impact positively in several ways i.e. Save the sector of over USD7.0m paid in rent annually, enhance affordability and accessibility of legal and judicial services in a one start and stop centre.

Monitoring and Evaluation

To ensure quality of work done at regional offices, the Ministry is currently undertaking Monitoring and evaluation for all Regional its offices at Arua, Mbarara, Gulu, Mbale and Moroto. Inspection for Mbarara regional office was completed if first quarter. However the budgetary cuts experienced in second quarter mean that monitoring for the remaining four regional office which was scheduled to take place in second quarter will be deferred until funds are available.

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Defending Government

The Attorney General continued the mandate of defending Government in various courts of law and Human rights tribunals across the county as such by the end of September 2015, the Attorney General handled a total of 682 cases and Human rights tribunals across the country out of which 31 cases were concluded in quarter 1 2015/16 and 651 are still ongoing. Out of the concluded cases, 26 Cases were won saving Government UGX. 161.85Bn. 7 Cases worth UGX 11.5Bn were lost.

Notable cases won by Government in First quarter included

The Directorate minimized the number of ex parte Proceedings to 10% however with the current Budgetary cuts this number may rise as the funds to facilitate State Attorneys to attend Court cases are very inadequate.

DRAFTING LEGISLATION

Drafting and monitoring the passage of several laws through Parliament was undertaken by the First Parliamentary Counsel. In First quarter, 10Bills were drafted and Published, 4 Acts published; 19 Statutory Instruments. There was no Legal Notices and ordinances published.

The number of Bills and Acts Drafted and published in First quarter was higher that expected due to the increases in demand fueled by the current election season for members of Parliament.

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PROVIDING LEGAL ADVICE

The Directorate of Legal Advisory Services received 1346 contracts and MoUs for review and approval by the end of September 2015, 1168 contracts had been reviewed and responded to. This represents 87% of the contracts and MoUs responded to. This performance is commendable.

In the same reporting time, The Directorate of Legal Advisory Services also received 216 requests for Legal Advice from Ministries, Parastatals, and other Agencies, out of which 173 were responded to. This represents 80% of the requests for Legal Advice responded to. Most of those not responded to lacked sufficient information backing them and additional information requested for from MDAs was not availed in time.

Preparation of Memoranda, agreements for execution by the Attorney General, submissions and attending arbitration proceedings were done by the Directorate and also represented the Ministry at both International and National for a

ADMINISTRATION OF ESTATES

The Administrator General attended to all clients country wide and by the end of First quarter FY2015/16, a total of 1109 new files for clients. This figure includes files opened at regional offices. The Administrator General also inspected 26 estates and granted 4 letters of Administration. In the same period 15 estates were successfully filed for winding up; made 783 applications to court to grant Certificates of No objection; and effected 42 Land Transfers , 256 Family Arbitrations and 260 Family Mediations were also concluded. The number Letters of Administration issued were less than planned because of the change in strategy as the Administrator General concentrated on empowering clients to administer their own estates.

Regulation of the Legal Profession

The Department of Law Council under its Disciplinary Committee concluded 35 cases against errant lawyers in 9 committee Sittings; The Department also inspected 26 Chambers /Law firms, 16 Legal Service Providers inspection of Universities and schools teaching law was scheduled to take place in second Quarter.

Actual number of sittings was affected by lack of quorum for the committees thereby reducing the number of concluded cases.

Human Resource Development

Posts filled

Three (3) posts of records assistants were filled through normal transfers. One (1) post of Commissioner Civil Litigation (Line Ministries) was declared to PSC for filling. One (1) post of Principal State Attorney was declared to PSC for filling. One (1) post of Senior State Attorney was declared to PSC for filling, One (1) post of Senior Procurement Officer was declared to MoFPED for filling. One (1) post of Accounts Assistant was declared to MoFPED for filling.

Training in professional courses:

For purposes of enhancing staff performance, the Ministry upheld undertaking capacity building initiatives for its legal staff in specialized fields. Three staff were trained in various fields i.e One (1) State Attorney was sent on training in an LLM in Oil and Gas, One (1) Library Assistant was trained in Managing Libraries and document centers, One (1) Principal State Attorney was trained in Legal English and Legal Writing.

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Promotion of staff:

One (1) Principal Human Resource Officer was promoted to Assistant Commissioner Human Resource Management.

2016/17 Planned Outputs

Deconcentration of Ministry Services:

The Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs has five Regional Offices i.e. Mbale, Mbarara, Gulu, Arua and Moroto. The offices were set up to provide services on behalf of the Ministry which among others include: Representation of Government in civil suits for and against Government, Providing legal advisory services to Local Governments and other government agencies. Drafting bills, ordinances and statutory instruments and administering estates of deceased and missing persons,

In an effort to decentralize and further extend its services closer to Local Governments and the people, the Ministry plans to open a Regional Office in Fort Portal to serve the districts of Kabarole, Kyenjonjo, Kamwenge, Kasese, Ntoroko, Bundibugyo, Kyegegwa, Kibaale, and Hoima. The Ministry was recently offered two offices by Kabarole District Local Government.

The Ministry opened up a Regional office in Mbarara way back in 2006. This office serves the thirty [30] districts of Masaka, Lwengo, Kalungu, Bukomansimbi, Lyantonde, Rakai, Sembabule, Kiruhura, Mbarara, Isingiro, Ibanda, Buhweju, Sheema, Bushenyi, Rubirizi, Mitooma, Rukungiri, Ntungamo, Kabale, Kisoro, Kanungu, Kabarole, Kamwenge, Ntoroko, Bundibugyo, Kyenjojo, Kasese, Kyegegwa, Kibaale and Hoima. Overtime the volume of work handled by Mbarara Regional Office has increased. This is mainly in attendance in Court, Human Rights Tribunals, Arbitration, Legal Advisory services, Administrator General and FPC. The office has ten Attorneys handling large volumes of work. Hence necessitating the opening of Fort Portal Regional office.

Equipping Regional offices:

The Ministry is continuing to equip its Regional offices to enable them serve better. The Ministry plans to procure and install solar power systems at all Regional offices in the coming FY2016/17 to help provide power for the offices. The Ministry also plans to purchase three vehicles for Fort portal and Mbale Regional offices.

Drafting Legislation:

The Ministry's Directorate of First Parliamentary Counsel will continue to perform its core function of drafting principal and subsidiary legislation to give effect to the policies of Government and to vet ordinances and byelaws of district and municipal councils. 15 Bills will be drafted and published. 10 Acts will be published, 55 statutory instruments, 3 Ordinances, 3 Bye Laws and 5 Legal Notices. Attending meetings with client Ministries and institutions to discuss draft Bills, attending parliamentary sessions and participating in EAC meetings will also be a major activity.

Vote Summary

Providing Legal Advice:

Continuous efforts will be put on expeditious drafting/reviewing of contracts, agreements and memoranda of understanding. Responses to requests for Legal advice and preparation of Cabinet Memoranda from Ministries, Parastatals, public and other agencies will be done within one week after receiving the request. Similarly, provision of legal guidance to Contracts Committees of Ministries, Local Governments, and Government Agencies will be expedited.

Administration of Estates:

Other activities of the Administrator General i.e. Inspection of estates, applying for letters of administration/probate, issuing certificates of No Objection and processing of land transfers will be maintained. The planned target from the administration of estates will include; opening up 4000 new files for clients, inspection of 100 estates, 200 applications to wind up estates to be filed. Apply to Court to grant 25 letters of administration, issue 2200 certificates of No Objection, effect 400 land transfers and conduct 1000 family arbitrations and mediations. Provision of office equipment, enhancing public awareness through various programs, websites and print media, intranet, and establishment of user committees and complaint mechanisms will also be a priority.

Regulation of the Legal profession:

Clearance of case backlog through holding special sessions; inspection and approval of chambers of advocates; inspection and approval of Universities teaching law degree programs; licensing Legal Aid Service Providers and monitoring and supervising their activities; Computerization of records management; Conducting public awareness programs through workshops and seminars; and regulation of pro-bono services by advocates are the major planned targets for the department of Law Council for FY2016/2017. Law Council plans to Conclude 100 Cases in 50 Sittings; inspect 700 Chambers /Law firms, 12 Universities and 20 Legal Service Providers.

Human Resource Development:

The Ministry will continue to train Staff to in order to acquire skills in legislative drafting, litigation, commercial law, customer care, counselling, family arbitration and mediation, computer skills as well as estates planning. Declaration of Vacant posts to Ministry of public service and Ministry of Finance for Filing and ensuring General Staff welfare.

Medium Term Plans

The Delayed institutional restructuring of the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs and the Departments of Administrator General, Law Council and Finance and Administration and the Regional Offices has continued to hamper the smooth flow of services to the general public. This manifests in form of inadequate manpower which undermines performance in Courts attendance, legal advisory services, legislation, estates management and regulation of the legal profession.

The Ministry wall also Continue to train more staff as part of human resource development. The Human Resource Development committee developed a comprehensive training program which ensures gender equity and equality between Ministry headquarters and Regional offices. Monitoring and evaluation of performance at headquarters and regional offices using properly designed performance indicators will ensure efficient and effective service delivery.

In terms of Legislative drafting the Ministry has prioritized drafting Principal and Subsidiary Legislation to give effect to the policies of Government.

The Implementation of Electronic Document and Records Management System (EDRMS) is already underway and ongoing and it will enable the Ministry to modernize records management of all Ministry Registries. Completion of this task will foster efficiency and effectiveness in the management of records which are currently manually managed. Case management system will be fully operationalized. Monitoring of cases and payments for Court awards, human rights awards and compensation will be simplified.

The Law Council Statute requires gazetting of all approved advocates chambers in the print media. The cost of this is UGX.100m per annum.

Currently, a total of 865 Disciplinary cases against errant layers are pending. Council members are not staff of the ministry but are paid allowances. Members of the disciplinary committee, hold hearing sessions once a week. The cases are therefore increasing at a faster rate than they are cleared leading to backlog. Over the last nine years the Ministry has opened four regional offices in Mbarara, Gulu, Arua, Moroto and Mbale; with the planned opening of Fortportal Regional office the number of MoJCA regional offices will rise to six in number. As a result of this deconcetration program, the Ministry has brought the legal services of; Litigation, Legislation, Legal advice and estates management nearer to the people. The poor and the marginalized are able to access the services of Administrator General cost effectively. Local Governments now use services of our regional offices instead of hiring private lawyers in matters of legal representation in courts as well as negotiations and drafting of contracts.

However, currently only UGX 1.2Bn is provided annually for the operations of the existing five regional offices. Let alone the six to be opened at Fort portal. This greatly incapacitates the service delivery in these areas. To enable the regional offices to render legal services to the local governments as well as the general public we need UGX.3.0 Bn per annum. Thus we have a shortfall of 1.8Bn

 $Operationalization\ of\ Center\ for\ Arbitration\ and\ Dispute$ $Resolution\ (CADER)$

CADER by law is mandated to steer and guide the growth of the Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) sector in Uganda. The Arbitration and Conciliation (Amendment), Bill 2007 provides for direct funding of CADER from the Treasury. The Ministry is continuously faced with the challenge of domestic arrears arising from court awards, human rights and compensations. Ministry of Finance pledged to provide funds to clear domestic arrears in four financial years however this has not been forthcoming leading to accumulation of amounts claimed. Government should prioritize clearing of arrears in the medium term by releasing funds to clear at least 25% of cases each financial year.

As a way forward, the Ministry is organizing sensitization workshop involving all MDAs on breach of contracts and observance of human rights.
