Performance highlights for the Quarter

- 1. The State of Qatar approved cooperation between Qatar University and, Makerere and Islamic Universities of Uganda.
- 2. The Mission carried out a familiarization trip to Uganda in May 2025 for Qatar travel agencies, and as well attended the Pearl of Africa Tourism Expo (POATE) in Kampala. The Travel Agencies visited impenetrable forest for Gorilla tracking, and Jinja for adventure activities and faith based tourism. They also engaged in over 100 Business-to-Business meetings with different Uganda Tour operators and other tourism stake holders at the POATE for tourism promotion between the two countries. In Jinja, the Agencies donated USD 7000 to Aisha Memorial orphanage school, and mobilized prayer mats (Carpets) for Aisha Memorial Mosque and Masjid Hidaya through Faith-based tourism.
- 3. Held a tourism and cultural expo in Doha involving tour operators, cultural performers, journalists and government official from Uganda, where Uganda's tourism offerings and its rich culture were showcased to Qatar travel agencies, government officials and other tourism stakeholders in the state of Qatar. The activity attracted 200 participants including the Uganda Diaspora.
- 4. Made 56 consular visits to; jails, police and deportation stations (53), and hospitals (03) to attend to Ugandans in need of consular assistance.
- 5. Attended to 8 Ugandan ladies in distress; 5 were mistreated by their bosses, 2 were victims of human trafficking, and 1 was a run-away case.
- 6. Issued 171 certificates of identity to Ugandans who had lost/expired passports to facilitate them to travel back home. Of these, 156 (91%) were for Ugandans on deportation.
- 7. Issued 53 letters of confirmation of residence to Ugandans in Qatar to facilitate renewal of passports (50), bank related issues (02), and change of residence (01).
- 8. Issued circulars to the diaspora community with contacts of the different Ugandan institutions for guidance on their individual aspirations and national development.

Variances and Challenges

- 1. Lack of timely feedback from Headquarters on the different signed MoUS to facilitate full implementation despite the continuous reminders.
- 2. Under funding in critical areas.
