The Embassy held 2 meetings with the Private Sector of South Sudan to foggy way on how the sister countries can mutually from manufacturing sector. the meetings are still going on and will result into signing of MOUs between Uganda and South Sudan.

Facilitated and coordinated the members of Uganda parliament to participate in the Parliamentary Games that were held in Juba South Sudan.

The Embassy did disseminate information about Ugandas tourism investment opportunities to the Nationals in South Sudan through the aid of radios, to the guests who to the Embassy for meetings and assistance and the Ministry of tourism of South Sudan.

2 meetings were held with the different Uganda zone leaders in Juba, the focus of the meeting were ie encourage them to invest back home in Uganda, acquire and abid by the laws of South Sudan; prepare themselves for 2026 general elections; participate in the environmental conservation and empower the female to actively participate in economic development activities and to educate the girl child.

The Embassy reached out to 2 primary schools in Juba to sensitized the girl child about their roles in the community development as the future mothers of the nations, the advantage of education, how to conduct themselves during their monthly periods and the Embassy also gave the school some scholastic materials and sanitary pad to the be distributed to the female studies in the 2 schools. In addition to that, the Embassy promoted the different culture of Uganda, the education system of Uganda and the tourism spots that they can visit during holidays.

Participated in 8 meetings whose focus was geared towards the maintained of peace in South Sudan.

The Embassy did facilitate the Ugandan community leaders in the States of Rumbek, Yambio and Torit to visit the Ugandans admitted in the Medical facilitates with the aim of sensitizing them on how to prolong their lives and avoid the spread of HIV-AIDS to others

The Embassy made arrangements a Ugandan owned clinic in South Sudan to help in the counselling of Uganda who are affected by the HIV AIDS.

Facilitated the team from Ministry of financial Planning & Economic Development during the Navision Training while upgrading the Navision system

VI. VOTE NARRATIVE

Vote Challenges

- 1. Spiraling inflation in the Republic of South Sudan has distorted the spending targets and reduced the real value of funds released to the Embassy.
- 2. Insecurity in the Host Country still curtail the Mission efforts of extending services to the Ugandan Diaspora Community in South Sudan
- 3. Low level of staffing; The Embassy currently has got five home based staff inclusive the Head of Mission amidst the enormous task to be accomplished.
- 4. External factors; The reluctance by our host government to respond on the requests made. This makes the Mission appear as if it does not perform.
- 5. High rental costs for the Chancery and staff accommodation.
- 6. Underfunding to enable the Mission execute its mandate effectively in South Sudan and to pay the emoluments of its staff being deployed from Headquarters without an accompanying budget

Plans to improve Vote Performance

- 1. The Mission does purchase in bulk and keeps some operation money in USD.
- 2. The Government of Uganda procured an Armored car for the mission and in addition the Mission deposited some money to UNHAS who can easily be contacted to airlift any Embassy official or Ugandan in need from any part of the Host country to Juba South Sudan..
- 3. The mission has been engaging all the staff including the Attaches' to help handle the enormous work in the mission. In addition to that the Mission engages officials from Ministries at home /Uganda on a case by case basis.
- 4 The Mission has had a continuous engagement with Government officials both in Uganda and host country to quicken the responses to the correspondence's shared, this has begun to yield good results in the missions work.
- 5. Regarding high cost of accommodation; The Mission in a short run has engaged the landlord not to increase rental fees.

However in the long run the Mission is now in the process of constructing her Chancery and two staff residential units. This shall reduce the cost of accommodation fees paid to the land lord.

The Embassy issued migration documents below 6373 certificates of Identification to Ugandans who don't have passports 24 Single entry Visas 12 Multiple entry 2 east Africa Tourist Visas to Nationals in South Sudan travel to 3 EAC States 4 Gratis Visas to Diplomats live and working in South Sudan.

The Embassy certified 65 academic documents and other legal documents of national in South Sudan.
